ABORTION - Very poor quality; messy failure; disaster.

ACAPULCO GOLD - High-quality marijuana from Acapulco, Mexico, with golden-hued leaves.

ACCIDENT - Person born from an unplanned pregnancy; unplanned pregnancy.

ACCIDENTALLY ON PURPOSE - Intentional action disguised as an accident.

ACE IN THE HOLE - Hidden reserve or advantage.

ACE IT - Score an "A" on an exam.

ACE OF SPADES - British slang for AIDS.

ACE UP ONE'S SLEEVE - Hidden advantage or trick.

ACES - Of the finest quality; superior.

ACID - Hallucinogen LSD; narcotic.

ACID FREAK (or Acidhead) - Heavy user of LSD.

ACID ROCK - Loud rock music with electronic sound effects, associated with LSD.

ACID TEST - Party where LSD is added to food/drink; psychedelic effects at a party.

ACROSS THE BOARD - Bet with equal wager on horse to win, place, or show; totalizator board at horse-racing tracks.

ACT - Pretended feeling or affected pretense; dramatic mimicking.

ACT LIKE ONE'S SHIT DOESN'T STINK - Behave haughtily with a sense of superiority.

ACT UP - Misbehave badly or improperly.

ACTION - Gambling activity; entertainment; sexual activity; criminal acts.

ACTIVATED - Intoxicated by alcohol; tipsy.

ACTOR - Athlete skilled at convincingly mimicking pain or fouls; baseball player who mimes getting hit.

AD LIB - Perform or speak spontaneously outside of planned script; Latin for "as one

wishes."

ADMAN - Advertising executive or copywriter.

ADMIN - Pertaining to administrative duties; administrative worker or assistant.

ADULT - Euphemism for content unsuitable for children, such as adult entertainment.

AFRO (or fro) - Hairstyle with tightly curled bouffant hair; black person.

AFTER - In pursuit of or desiring something; "She's after that job."

AFTER EIGHT - Romantic meeting or date; "After Eight" refers to a chocolate.

AFTERPARTY - Intimate gathering following another party.

AGE OUT - Reach an age where drugs no longer have desired effect, leading to voluntary cessation.

AHEAD OF THE GAME - In a winning or advantageous position.

AIN'T - Something or someone emphatically not.

AIR - Broadcast via radio or television.

AIR ONE'S BELLY - Vomit.

AIR ONE'S DIRTY LAUNDRY - Discuss or argue about intimate matters in public.

AIR QUOTES - Twisting fingers to quote, emphasize, or sarcastically reference a statement.

AIRHEAD - Stupid or silly person.

ALKY (or alki) - Alcohol; inferior whiskey; chronic alcoholic.

ALL EARS - Eager to listen; attentively receptive.

ALL HELL BROKE LOOSE - Situation became chaotic, dangerous, or noisy.

ALL IN ONE PIECE - Unharmed; emerged intact.

ALL OVER IT - Handling something promptly and efficiently.

ALL OVER SOMEONE - Affectionate or amorous; aggressively smothering or assaulting.

ALL OVER THE MAP - Unfocused, inconsistent, or confused.

ALL RIGHT ALREADY - Expression indicating having heard or had enough.

ALL RIGHTY - Humorous or childlike way to say "all right."

ALL THAT - Very cool or impressive.

ALL THE RAGE - Current trend or latest fashion.

ALL THE WAY - Without reservation; to the end.

ALL THUMBS - Very awkward or inept.

ALL-CLEAR - Authorization to proceed; signal of no further danger.

ALL-OUT - Withholding nothing; making a maximum effort.

ALL-RIGHT - Good, commendable; exclamation of strong approval or success.

ALLERGIC - Strong aversion to something or somebody.

ALLEY CAT - Homeless or stray cat; sexually promiscuous person.

ALLIGATOR BAIT - Derogatory term used in Florida or Louisiana for a black person.

ALMOND ROCKS (UK) - Socks.

AMATEUR NIGHT - Occasion where professionals perform poorly; casual sex act with a non-prostitute.

AMBIDEXTROUS - Bisexual.

AMBULANCE CHASER - Unethical lawyer or one aggressively seeking clients; lawyer encouraging accident victims to sue.

AMPED - Excited or angry; high on methamphetamine.

ANCHORMAN - Lowest-ranking student in a class; TV news broadcaster with principal role.

ANCIENT HISTORY - Something or someone from the past; old romance.

ANGEL DUST - Powdered PCP, a veterinary tranquilizer, used as a narcotic; synthetic heroin.

ANGEL'S KISS (AU) - Urine (slang).

ANGLE - Devious action disguised as altruism for profit or advantage.

ANIMAL - Brutal, aggressive person; one inclined toward excessive sexuality or violence.

ANKLE-BITER - Child.

ANNIHILATED - Very intoxicated or drugged.

ANTE UP - Contribute money one is responsible for; initial contribution to a poker pot.

ANTHEA TURNER (UK) - Earner; well-paying job.

ANYHOO - Humorous mispronunciation of "anyhow."

APPLES AND PEARS (UK) - Stairs.

APPLES TO ORANGES - Unfair comparison.

ARISTOTLE (UK) - Bottle.

ARM-TWISTING - Strong persuasion.

ARMITAGE SHANK (UK) - Bank.

AROUND (or around the block) - Experienced, clever individual; not naive.

ARRIVE - Successfully establish one's position or reputation.

ARTHUR CONAN DOYLE (UK) - To boil.

AS RIGHT AS RAIN - Completely correct or in good condition.

AS SURE AS HELL - Absolutely certain; without a doubt.

ASAP - Right away; immediately.

ASCOT HEATH (UK) - Teeth.

ASPHALT JUNGLE - Urban landscape; large city.

ASS - Buttocks; sex partner; sexual gratification; the person; used for emphasis.

ASS BACKWARDS - Reversed or confused manner; in a backward way.

ASS MAN - Man with a strong interest in sexual activity or buttocks.

ASS-CHEWING - Verbal reprimand or scolding.

ASS-KISSER - Flatterer who seeks favor with superiors; sycophant; brown-noser.

ASS-KISSING - Flattery to gain favor; brown-nosing.

ASS-WIPE (or butt-wipe) - Toilet paper; idiot or fool.

ASSFUCK - Act of anal intercourse.

ASSHOLE (or butthole) - Anus; despised person.

ASSKICKING - Functioning or performing well.

AT LIBERTY - Unemployed.

AT LOOSE ENDS - Confused or without direction.

ATTITUDE - Resentful and hostile manner.

ATTITUDE-ADJUSTER - Police officer's club or stick.

AUNT FLO - Woman's menstrual period.

AUSTIN POWER (UK) - To take a shower.

AUTOPILOT - Automatic action without self-awareness.

AVOID LIKE THE PLAGUE - Evade or shun at any cost.

AWESOME - Excellent; wonderful; outstanding; cool.

AWFUL - Extremely unpleasant or objectionable.

AWOL - Absent without leave; unauthorized absence of a soldier.

AXE - Musical instrument, usually a guitar; dismiss someone; eliminate.

AXMAN - Guitarist, especially in a band or group.

AZTEC TWO-STEP - Diarrhea.

B MOVIE - A low-budget movie intended for entertainment purposes rather than artistic value.

B-BALL - Informal term for basketball.

B-BOY - 1. A fan or enthusiast of rap music. 2. A stylishly dressed individual.

B-GIRL - A promiscuous girl or woman, often working in a bar as a hostess to encourage drink sales.

BA DA BING, BA DA BOOM - An exclamation describing something that happens quickly and easily.

BABE - A girl or woman, especially one considered sexually desirable. Often regarded as offensive by many women. Experienced a resurgence in the 1990s.

BABE MAGNET or CHICK MAGNET - A male or one of his possessions that attracts females, particularly beautiful ones.

BABELICIOUS - Term used to describe someone who is very sexually attractive. Coined in the film "Wayne's World" in 1992.

BABOON - An uncouth or stupid person.

BABY - 1. A term used to refer to a wife, girlfriend, or other cherished woman. Can also be used to refer to a husband, boyfriend, or cherished man. 2. Any cherished or putatively cherished person. 3. A mean and dangerous man, a tough guy. 4. A term of address for a man or a woman. 5. Anything regarded with special affection, admiration, pride, or awe. 6. A thing referred to, especially something whose name is unknown.

BABY BEAR - An ideal or perfect state or condition.

BABY BLUES - Blue eyes.

BABY BOOM - A significant rise in births, especially after 1945, referring to the millions of baby-boom couples who work for wages.

BABY BOOMER - A person born during the baby boom following World War II.

BABY DOLL - A pretty woman, especially one cherished by a man as his own.

BABY SPLIT - A split in bowling where two pins are left standing side by side.

BABY-KISSER - A politician who engages in the practice of kissing babies, shaking hands, etc.

BABY-SIT - 1. To attend and care for a child or anyone or anything requiring care. 2. To be a guide and companion to someone undergoing a psychedelic drug experience.

BABY-SITTER - A destroyer that guards an aircraft carrier (Navy term from the Vietnam War).

BABYCAKES or HONEYCAKES - A sweetheart or other cherished person. Term of endearment.

BABYLON - Slang term referring to the police.

BACH or BATCH - A bachelor. Also used as a verb to indicate living alone.

BACHELOR GIRL - An unmarried young woman, usually with a career or profession.

BACK - 1. As a chaser in drinks, e.g., whiskey with water back. 2. A person who

provides support and assistance; a reliable ally. 3. To give support to an effort or person. 4. To bet on something. 5. To contribute money for something.

BACK ALLEY - An alley or street in a mean and disreputable neighborhood, often associated with slums.

BACK DOOR - 1. A devious, shady, and possibly illegal means. 2. The anus; asshole.

BACK DOWN - To retreat from one's position, surrender, or retract.

BACK IN THE SADDLE - Operational again; restored to function.

BACK NUMBER - Someone or something out of date; a has-been.

BACK OFF - 1. To stop annoying or harassing someone. 2. To soften or moderate; relent. 3. To slow down; go easier.

BACK OUT - To cancel or renege on an arrangement.

BACK PASSAGE - The rectum.

BACK SEAT - Take a subordinate or less prominent role.

BACK SOMEONE OFF - To order someone to leave; eject someone.

BACK SOMEONE UP - 1. To confirm what someone says; support what someone does. 2. To be someone's substitute; be in reserve. 3. In baseball, to play behind a fielder to retrieve balls that might be missed.

BACK TALK - Impudent response; impertinent comment.

BACK TEETH ARE FLOATING - One needs to urgently urinate.

BACK TO SQUARE ONE - Returned to the starting point, usually after wasting a great deal of effort.

BACK TO THE (OLD) DRAWING BOARD - The matter must be reconsidered; it's time to start again.

BACK TO THE SALT MINES - Returned to hard work and unremitting discomfort after a period of relative ease and pleasure.

BACK YARD, THE - The performers as distinguished from the management, especially in the circus.

BACK-BURNER - To put a project, idea, suggestion, etc., in reserve.

BACK-PEDAL - To retreat, especially from a stated position.

BACK-SLAPPER - A demonstratively friendly person.

BACK-TRACK - To retrace one's steps; go back on a decision or commitment.

BACKASSED - In a backward or awkward manner.

BACKBENCHER - An occupant of a rear seat in a legislature, often referring to an obscure legislator.

BACKBONE - Integrity and courage; fortitude.

BACKBREAKER - A very difficult job or task.

BACKCHANNEL - A secret conduit for information.

BACKCHAT - Impertinent and provocative replies, especially to a superior or elder.

BACKDOOR - Dishonest or dubious. Can also mean "secret" or "illegitimate."

BACKDOOR MAN - A married woman's lover.

BACKDOOR TROTS - Diarrhea.

BACKGATE (or BACKDOOR) PAROLE - The death of a prisoner from natural causes.

BACKHANDER - 1. A blow made with the back of a hand, especially to the face. 2. Secret payment.

BACKHOUSE - An outdoor toilet house without plumbing; outhouse, fireless cooker, privy.

BACKROOM - Having to do with political expediency; from the inner circles of party affairs.

BACKSCRATCH or BACKSCRATCHING - A helping or accommodating of one by another.

BACKSEAT DRIVER - A person who gives unwanted and officious advice.

BACKSIDE - The buttocks; rump.

BACKSLAPPING - Demonstratively friendly.

BACKWASH - Something drunk that is regurgitated or spit back out.

BACON - Bring home the bacon, meaning to earn a living or provide for one's family.

BAD - Good; excellent; admirable.

BAD ACTOR (or ACTRESS) - 1. A malicious or deceitful person. 2. A habitual criminal. 3. A vicious animal.

BAD BOOKS - Being in someone's disfavor or out of favor.

BAD BOY - An impressive and perhaps dangerous device.

BAD BUSINESS - 1. A morally questionable activity. 2. Poor business conduct.

BAD COP - Refers to the role of a police officer who uses aggressive or intimidating tactics, often contrasted with a "good cop" who adopts a more sympathetic approach.

BAD DAY AT BLACK ROCK - An unhappy time or situation.

BAD EGG - A villain, criminal, or other deplorable person.

BAD HAIR DAY - A day when nothing goes right; a day filled with unfortunate events.

BAD MAN (or GUY) - A villain; a desperado.

BAD NEWS - 1. The bill for goods or services, especially a restaurant check. 2. Any unfortunate or regrettable situation or event. 3. An ominous person; a menace. 4. An unpleasant or persistently annoying person.

BAD PAPER - 1. Worthless or counterfeit money, checks, etc. 2. A less-than-honorable discharge from military service.

BAD PATCH - A period of difficulty or suffering.

BAD RAP - 1. An erroneous conviction or sentence; wrongful punishment. 2. Any unjustified condemnation.

BAD SCENE - Something unpleasant, especially a displeasing and depressing experience or situation.

BAD SHIT - 1. Something menacing and nasty. 2. Bad luck. 3. A toxic or contaminated narcotic.

BAD TIME - Time spent in the guardhouse, not counting towards one's required period of service in the armed forces.

BAD TRIP - 1. A frightening or depressing drug experience, especially with LSD. 2. Any unpleasant occasion or experience.

BAD-MOUTH - To disparage or denigrate someone or something.

BADASS - 1. Difficult to deal with. 2. Excellent; wonderful.

BADDIE (or BADDY) or BAD GUY - 1. Someone or something that is bad, especially a movie, television, or sports villain. 2. A criminal or other habitually reprehensible person.

BADGER GAME - 1. A method of extortion where a woman entices a victim into a

sexually compromising situation, followed by demands for payment. 2. A means of blackmail, extortion, or intimidation, often based on a compromising situation.

BAFFLEGAB - The pompous and opaque prose style affected by bureaucrats and certain scholars.

BAG - 1. The scrotum. 2. A condom. 3. The cushion-like marker that serves as a base in baseball. 4. A portion of narcotics. 5. A woman's breast. 6. An unattractive girl or woman. 7. That which one prefers or is doing currently. 8. One's preference; something suited to one's preferences or talents. 9. An environment; milieu; scene. 10. Various slang usages, such as to get or capture, to arrest, to discharge, to suppress, to avoid or not attend, to abandon or cease, to include or categorize, to break into for a clandestine investigation, and to inhale fumes of an intoxicating substance.

BAG AND BAGGAGE - Entirely; leaving nothing; with all one's possessions.

BAG ASS - To leave quickly; get out; hurry.

BAG IT! - Shut up! Also, to bring one's lunch in a brown paper bag.

BAG JOB - A theft or burglary, especially of files or documents.

BAG LADY (or SHOPPING-BAG LADY or BAG WOMAN) - 1. A woman who goes about the streets collecting discarded objects and carrying them home in shopping bags. 2. A homeless woman, often elderly, who lives in public places and carries her possessions in shopping bags.

BAG OF WIND - Synonymous with WINDBAG.

BAG OF WORMS - See CAN OF WORMS.

BAG ON SOMEONE (also BAG) - To criticize someone; insult; dump on; put down.

BAG SOME RAYS - To sunbathe.

BAG THAT - Forget that! Dismiss or disregard.

BAG YOUR FACE - Conceal your face; you are repulsive. A generalized insult.

BAG Zs - Synonymous with COP Zs.

BAGEL - A tennis set won 6-0, also used in other sports to mean "zero, zip."

BAGGAGE - Excess baggage, referring to burdens or issues from the past.

BAGGED - 1. Drunk. 2. Prearranged; fixed. 3. Exhausted.

BAGGER - Referring to various types of achievements or classifications in sports.

BAGGIES - 1. Loose-cut boxer-type men's bathing trunks. 2. Full trousers with cuffs resembling those of the 1930s.

BAGMAN - 1. A person who collects money for bribers, extortionists, mobsters, etc. 2. A person who peddles drugs.

BAGS - 1. Trousers. 2. A woman's breasts. 3. A great quantity.

BAGS OF MYSTERY - Sausages, referring to the uncertain nature of the ingredients.

BAIL - To leave; cut out; split.

BAIL ON SOMEONE - 1. To break a date with someone; stand someone up. 2. To tease or speak spitefully about someone; criticize someone.

BAIL OUT - To abandon an effort, project, relationship, etc., in order to minimize losses.

BAIL OUT ON - To leave someone behind or in the lurch.

BAIL SOMEONE OUT - To get someone out of a difficult plight; relieve someone of debt, embarrassment, etc.

BAIT MONEY - Money given to a thief containing a device that will dye the money and the thief.

BAKE AND SHAKE - A search, especially a body search for narcotics. Also, to cremate a body and scatter the ashes.

BAKED - 1. Intoxicated with narcotics; high; stoned. 2. Sunburned.

BAKING - Refers to an extremely warm and damp condition.

BALDERDASH - Nonsense! Denotes something as pure balderdash.

BALDY (or BALDIE) - 1. A bald man. 2. A worn automobile tire.

BALL - 1. A testicle. 2. A dollar, especially a silver dollar. 3. The game of baseball. 1. To do the sex act; copulate with; screw. 2. To have an especially good time; enjoy oneself in a relaxed and uninhibited way.

BALL GAME - 1. A given set of conditions; complex of circumstances; situation. 2. A competition; rivalry. 3. The decisive element or event, especially in a competition or encounter; the name of the game.

BALL IS IN SOMEONE'S COURT - The next action, decision, response, etc., belongs to the person or persons indicated.

BALL OF FIRE - A dazzling performer; spectacularly successful striver; overachiever; go-getter; hot shot.

BALL OF WAX - Refers to the whole matter or situation; everything involved.

BALL THE JACK - 1. To move or work very rapidly. 2. To gamble or risk everything on one stroke or try.

BALL UP - Confusion; blundering. Also means to confuse, mix up, or lead astray.

BALL, A - An especially good time; a loud, funny party.

BALL-AND-CHAIN - Refers to one's wife; old woman.

BALL-BUSTER - 1. Something that is very difficult to accomplish; a Herculean task; killer. 2. Someone who assigns and monitors extremely difficult tasks. 3. An intimidating man; ruffian; enforcer, gorilla. 4. A woman who saps or negates a man's masculinity; castrating female.

BALL-BUSTING - The sapping or destruction of masculinity; nut-crunching.

BALL-WRACKER - Synonymous with BALL-BUSTER.

BALLED UP - In a thoroughly confused and futile condition; erroneous and useless because of perverse incompetence; fucked up, screwed up.

BALLING - Fun, especially of an uninhibited sort.

BALLOCKS or BOLLOCKS - Rubbish; nonsense. Also refers to the testicles.

BALLOON - 1. A hobo's bedroll; bindle. 2. A condom. 3. A dollar bill; one dollar. 4. A platoon. 5. The floating blob with a line to a speaker's mouth, used to show speech in comic strips. v. To lose one's lines completely during a performance.

BALLOON ROOM - A room where marijuana is smoked; Beat Pad.

BALLOONHEAD - A stupid person; airhead.

BALLOONHEADED - Stupid; oafish.

BALLOONS - Refers to a woman's breasts, especially large ones.

BALLOT BOX - Refers to stuffing the ballot box, the act of fraudulent voting.

BALLPARK FIGURE (or ESTIMATE) - A rough numerical approximation.

BALLPARK or PARK - Claimed or designated special territory; turf.

BALLS - 1. An exclamation of incredulity, disappointment, or disgust. 2. Refers to the testicles. 3. Courage; nerve; guts. 4. Nonsense; poppycock.

BALLS TO THE WALL - At or to the extreme; at full speed; all-out; flat out.

BALLS-OUT - Very great; extreme; total.

BALLS-UP - A confused and inept blunder; fuck-up.

BALLSINESS or BALLINESS - Courage; balls; guts.

BALLSY - Courageous; spunky; gutsy.

BALLY and BALLYHOO - Refers to advertising or publicity, especially of a raucous and colorful sort.

BALLYHOOED - Much publicized; hyped.

BALMED or BALMY - Intoxicated with alcohol.

BALMY - Crazy; insane.

BALONEY or BOLOGNA - 1. Nonsense; pretentious talk; bold and deceitful absurdities.
2. A stupid person.

BALTIC - Used in the UK to describe extremely cold weather.

BALTIMORE CHOP - A batted baseball that hits the plate or close in front of the plate and bounces high in the air.

BAM - 1. A mixture of a depressant with a stimulant drug, especially a barbiturate with an amphetamine. 2. Refers to a woman marine. 3. (also bamm, bammo) An exclamation imitating a hard blow. Can also mean to strike or hit.

BAM-AND-SCRAM - A hit-and-run accident.

BAMBI - 1. A deer that appears out of nowhere, as on a highway. 2. A person very new to something; newbie.

BAMBINO - 1. A baby or young child. 2. A ruffian; an intimidating man; gorilla; torpedo.

BAMBOO CURTAIN - The barrier of secrecy and exclusion that once cut off the People's Republic of China and other Asian Communist countries from the rest of the world.

BAMBOOZLE - To hoax; trick; swindle; flimflam.

BAMBOOZLED - Confused; mystified.

BAMPOT - A derogatory term used in Scotland to describe a foolish or annoying person.

BANANA - 1. A comedian, especially in a burlesque show. 2. A sexually attractive light-skinned black woman. 3. The penis. 4. An Oriental sympathetic with and part of

the white majority society. 5. A patient with jaundice. 6. A fool; an idiot. 7. A crazy person; loony.

BANANA BALL - A hit or thrown ball that curves off to the right.

BANANA OIL - Nonsense, especially when used to flatter and mislead; bunk.

BANANA REPUBLIC - A small country, especially Central American, dominated by foreign companies.

BANANAHEAD - A stupid person.

BANANAS - 1. Crazy; nuts. 2. Very enthusiastic; highly excited; ape. 3. Homosexual.

BANANAS - When someone goes crazy or acts in an irrational manner.

BAND - Refers to a big band or to beat the band.

BAND-AID - A temporary or stopgap remedy.

BANDBOX - A small or rural jail, especially one that seems easy to escape from.

BANDIT - 1. An enemy aircraft. 2. An aggressive homosexual.

BANDWAGON - The strong current popularity and impetus of a person, idea, party, etc.

BANG - Precisely; exactly. 1. A very pleasurable sensation; surge of joy; thrill; kick; rush. 2. An injection of a narcotic, especially an intravenous shot of heroin. 3. The sex act. 4. An exclamation point; shriek. 5. A drink of liquor; shot. 1. To do the sex act with or to; copulate with. 2. To be in a youth gang; be a gangbanger.

BANG AWAY - 1. To continue firing a gun or guns. 2. To attack relentlessly.

BANG FOR THE BUCK - Value for what one pays.

BANG ON - Completely accurate or precisely correct; exactly.

BANG OUT - To make or compose something, especially to write something, in a hurry.

BANG OUT OF ORDER - Completely unacceptable behavior or actions.

BANG PEOPLE'S HEADS TOGETHER - Used to denote forcing a group of people to cooperate.

BANG TO RIGHTS - Synonymous with dead to rights.

BANG-UP - Excellent; superior.

BANGER - 1. A cylinder in an automobile engine. 2. A car, especially an old and decrepit vehicle; heap; jalopy. 3. The front bumper of a vehicle. 4. Gangbanger.

BANGER - In the UK, it can refer to a sausage or an old, often dilapidated car.

BANGERS AND MASH - A minor car accident; bumper-thumper, fender-bender.

BANGING - 1. Good and wonderful; exciting and energetic. 2. Loud and relentless.

BANGTAIL - A racehorse.

BANJAX - To defeat utterly; clobber.

BANJAXED - Being intoxicated or under the influence of alcohol.

BANJO HITTER - A player who gets hits weakly just past the infield and usually has a low batting average.

BANJOED - Being heavily intoxicated or under the influence of drugs.

BANK - Money.

BANK ON - Depend or rely on.

BANKABLE - Having a reputation or influence that ensures the success of a project.

BANKER'S HOURS - Short working hours.

BANKROLL - To finance; put up the money for, especially for a theatrical production.

BARE-BONES - Unadorned; spare; minimally accoutered.

BAREBACK - Without using a condom.

BAREBACK RIDER - A man who does the sex act without using a condom.

BAREFACED or BAREFACE - Bold; shameless; unscrupulous.

BARF - 1. An exclamation of strong disgust. 2. To vomit. 3. To respond strangely or

with an error warning after unacceptable input.

BARF BAG - 1. A paper bag provided on airplanes, ambulances, etc., to catch and hold vomit. 2. A disgusting person; something disgusting; douche bag, scumbag.

BARF CITY - Disgusting; loathsome; yucky.

BASED - When children are grounded or not allowed to go out as a disciplinary measure.

BASEHEAD - A drug addict, specifically one who uses freebase cocaine.

BASH - 1. A lively social gathering or party. 2. To strike or hit forcefully. 3. To criticize or condemn.

BASHED - 1. Crushed or smashed. 2. Intoxicated or heavily under the influence of alcohol.

BASKET - 1. The abdominal area, specifically the pit of the stomach. 2. Slang for male genitals.

BASKET CASE - A person who is utterly helpless, hopeless, or emotionally distraught.

BATTERY ACID - Slang for coffee.

BE THERE OR BE SQUARE - One should attend an event or else be considered an outsider.

BE THERE WITH BELLS ON - Expressing eagerness and happiness to be present at a particular place or event.

BE-ALL AND END-ALL - Something considered as the ultimate or most crucial element or factor.

BEACH BLANKET BINGO - Sexual activity on the beach.

BEACH BUM - A man who frequently visits beaches, often associated with surfing and displaying muscular physique.

BEACH BUNNY - A girl who spends time with surfers, whether or not she is a surfer herself.

BEACHED WHALE - A term used to describe a severely obese person, particularly someone who requires assistance to get out of bed or a chair.

BEAN COUNTER - A statistician, arithmetical clerk, or accountant working in government or business.

BEAN FLICKER - In the UK, a term used to refer to a lesbian.

BET THE FARM (OR THE RANCH) - To risk everything; to wager all of one's assets or resources.

BIMMY - Slang term for BIMBO, used as a substitute or alternative.

BIN, THE - Slang term for the loony bin, a psychiatric hospital. Also used in the context of a weenie bin.

BIND - Refers to a very tight and awkward situation or a cleft stick.

BINDERS - Refers to the brakes of a car, particularly used in British slang.

BINDLE or BIDDLE - 1. A blanket-roll holding one's possessions, commonly used by hoboos. 2. Any package or bundle. 3. A packet of narcotics, especially when folded as an envelope.

BINDLESTIFF - 1. Refers to a migrant harvest worker, especially a hobo with his bindle. 2. Any hobo or derelict.

BING - 1. An exclamation in reaction to something sudden, similar to bingo. 2. A packet of narcotics or a prison cell used for solitary confinement.

BINGE - Refers to a spree, particularly a drunken spree, or to carouse and consume inordinately.

BINGED - Vaccinated, as used in the armed forces during WWI.

BINGER - 1. A person who goes on sprees. 2. Refers to a home run in baseball.

BINGLE - 1. Refers to a base hit in baseball, especially a single. 2. A collision, particularly an automobile accident (Australian usage).

BINGO - 1. An exclamation in reaction to something sudden and unexpected or expressing sudden success. 2. Cheap wine. 3. Refers to a gambling game.

BINOCS - Slang term for binoculars.

BIO or BIOG - Short for biography, especially a brief one in a yearbook, theater program, etc.

BIOFLICK or BIOPIC - Refers to a movie or television show based on someone's life story.

BIONIC - 1. Having electromechanical body parts. 2. Having extraordinary strength, powers, or capabilities, often described as superhuman.

BIOTCH - 1. Refers to a woman one dislikes or disapproves of. 2. An affectionate term for a girl or woman. 3. A man who acts like a bitch, especially a wimpy man.

BIPPY or BIBBY - Slang term for the buttocks, or ass.

BIRD - 1. Refers to a group of guys in a bird bar on Third Avenue. 2. Refers to a person of either sex, often elderly. 3. Describes somebody or something excellent. 4. Refers to a young woman, also known as a chick. 5. Refers to an odd or unusual person, an eccentric. 6. Slang term for a male homosexual. 7. Refers to the eagle insignia of a colonel's rank. 8. Refers to an aircraft, especially a helicopter. 9. Refers to a communications satellite. 9. In the UK, a colloquial term for a woman, especially a girlfriend or partner.

BIRD COLONEL - Refers to a chicken colonel, a term for a colonel in the military.

BIRD DOG - 1. A person whose job is to find something or someone, like a detective or talent scout. 2. Refers to a chaperon at a dance or a third person on a date appointed to be vigilant. 3. Refers to a tactical officer enforcing order and discipline. 4. Refers to a fighter or interceptor aircraft. 5. Refers to an aircraft that spotted and marked targets. 6. Refers to the automatic direction-finding instrument of an aircraft. 7. Refers to a radar detector. Used as a verb to act as a bird dog or to seduce someone's boyfriend.

BIRD WATCHER - Refers to a male who enjoys watching females.

BIRD, THE - 1. A rude flatulATORY noise made with the tongue and lips to express disapproval, derision, or contempt. 2. Refers to giving the finger.

BIRDBRAIN - Refers to a person of meager intelligence, an idiot.

BIRDBRAINED - Describes someone who is stupid.

BIRDFARM - Slang term for an aircraft carrier.

BIRDIES - Slang term for thin, bony legs.

BIRDS - Refers to idiomatic expressions such as "for the birds" and "lovebirds."

BIRDS AND THE BEES, THE - Refers to the basic facts about sex and reproduction, especially as explained to children.

BIRDS OF A FEATHER - Refers to people who share an interest or talent.

BIRDSEED - 1. Refers to a small amount of money. 2. Nonsense.

BIRDSHIT - Slang term for chicken shit.

BIRDTURD - Slang term for a despicable person, a prick or shit.

BIRDY or BIRDIE - Describes someone who is strange or possibly crazy.

BIRTHDAY SUIT - Refers to being completely nude, in one's state of nakedness.

BISCUIT - 1. Slang term for the buttocks or ass. 2. Refers to a small person. 3. Refers to the human head.

BISCUIT-SHOOTER - Refers to a cook, especially on a ranch.

BISH - An alternative form of the word "bitch."

BISH - Slang term for a mistake.

BISON - Slang term meaning to vomit.

BISSEL - Yiddish term meaning a bit or a little.

BISTRO - Refers to a restaurant or cafe.

BIT - Describes feeling disappointed and resentful. Also used to refer to a prison sentence, a small part in a play, or a person's particular set of attitudes and behaviors.

BIT BANGER - 1. Refers to a programmer who works out details of a computer program. 2. Refers to assembly-language programmers as distinct from applications programmers.

BIT MUCH - Describes something as more than necessary or in good taste.

BIT OF FLUFF - Slang term for a girl or young woman.

BIT ON THE SIDE - Refers to a sexual relationship outside of a committed partnership or marriage.

BIT PART - Refers to a small part in a play or show.

BIT THICK - Describes someone or something as overly dramatic.

BIT-GRINDING - Refers to the processing of data into a computer.

BITCH - 1. Refers to a woman one dislikes or disapproves of. 2. Refers to a girl. 3. Refers to a male homosexual. 4. Refers to the queen of any suit in playing cards. Also used in various idiomatic expressions.

BITCH BOX - Slang term for a public-address system.

BITCH IN HEAT - Refers to a sexually predatory or promiscuous woman.

BITCH KITTY - 1. Refers to an especially disliked or disagreeable woman. 2. Refers to an especially unpleasant or difficult task. 3. Refers to anything especially pleasant or admirable.

BITCH OF A - Describes something as very remarkable, awful, admirable, distressing, etc.

BITCH OUT - To complain or denigrate.

BITCH SESSION - 1. Refers to a meeting where complaints and grievances are voiced, especially by labor-union representatives. 2. Refers to a bull session or casual discussion.

BITCH SLAMMER - Slang term for a women's prison.

BITCHIN' or BITCHEN or BITCHING - Slang term meaning good, excellent, or superior. Can be used as an adverb to mean very or extremely.

BITCHY - 1. Describes someone who has the traits of a bitch, mean, nasty, or vindictive. 2. Describes someone who is good-looking or chic. 3. Describes someone who is sexually provocative.

BITE - 1. Refers to one's share of or the amount of a sum owed or demanded. 2. Refers to a short excerpt or film-clip shown on television news. Used as a verb to accept a deception as truth, to borrow money from, to anger or annoy, or to appropriate or steal. Also used as a slang term for suck.

BITE ME - Slang term meaning "fuck you" or "go to hell."

BITE MY ASS - Slang term meaning "kiss my ass."

BITE OFF MORE THAN ONE CAN CHEW - To undertake more than one can do, to overreach oneself.

BITE ON SOMEONE - To copy someone else, especially to dress the same way.

BITE ONE'S TONGUE - To restrain one's speech, often with difficulty.

BITE SOMEONE'S ASS - To anger or annoy someone.

BITE SOMEONE'S HEAD OFF - To react angrily or jump down someone's throat.

BITE THE BIG ONE - 1. To be a total failure. 2. To perform fellatio or suck.

BITE THE BULLET - To accept the cost of a course of action or do something painful but necessary.

BITE THE DUST - 1. To die or be killed. 2. To fail or be destroyed.

BITE YOUR TONGUE - To retract or be ashamed of what you just said.

BITE, THE - Refers to expense, charge, cost, or damage.

BITER - 1. Refers to someone who copies another. 2. Refers to a thief. 3. Refers to teeth.

BITSY - Describes something as very small.

BIZ - Short for business, referring to show business.

BIZARRO - Describes something as bizarre.

BJ - Slang term for a blow job or act of fellatio.

BK - Abbreviation for a Burger King fast-food restaurant.

BLAB - 1. Refers to idle talk or nonsense. Used as a verb to talk on and on or say more than one ought, especially to incriminate oneself or others.

BLABBERMOUTH - Refers to a person who talks too much, especially revealing personal or secret matters indiscreetly.

BLACK AND BLUE - Refers to being beat up physically or emotionally.

BLACK AND TAN - Refers to a place that is occupied or patronized by both blacks and whites, interracial.

BLACK AND WHITE - 1. Refers to a capsule containing an amphetamine and a sedative, or two amphetamines. 2. Refers to a police car.

BLACK BOX - Refers to secrecy, classified material, or intelligence interests.

BLACK CATTER - Someone who always claims to be superior or better than others.

BLACK DIAMONDS - See DIAMONDS.

BLACK DOG, THE - Refers to melancholia or the blues.

BLACK EYE - 1. Refers to an eye surrounded with darkened areas of contusion. 2. Refers to a bad reputation or adverse and damaging public image.

BLACK FRIDAY - The day after Thanksgiving in the USA, known for being the busiest shopping day of the year.

BLACK GANG - Refers to the fireroom and boiler-room crew of a ship.

BLACK GOLD - Refers to oil or crude oil.

BLACK HAT - 1. Refers to a villain or heavy. 2. Refers to the badge or symbol of a villain. 3. A person who uses their computer skills for criminal or unethical purposes.

BLACK HOLE - Refers to a place where things mysteriously disappear. Can also refer to a region of extreme gravitational attraction or a prison cell.

BLACK MARIA - Refers to a patrol wagon used to carry police prisoners.

BLACK MONEY (or CASH) - 1. Refers to money obtained illegally that must be "laundered" before use. 2. Refers to income not reported for tax purposes.

BLACK OPERATOR - Refers to a secret agent.

BLACK STUFF - 1. Refers to opium. 2. Refers to a black woman or women as sex partners, especially for a white man.

BLACK TAR - Refers to distilled and concentrated heroin.

BLACK-BAG JOB - Refers to a burglary or robbery done by government agents.

BLACK-COLLAR WORKER - Refers to a person who exclusively wears black.

BLACK-ON-BLACK - Refers to crimes committed by black people against other blacks.

BLACKBALL or BLACKLIST - To punish someone by denial of work or boycotting of products. Can also refer to a list of banned or undesirable people.

BLACKLIST - A list of banned or undesirable people. To put someone's name on such a list.

BLACKOUT - 1. Refers to a period during which discount or favorable prices on airlines are canceled. 2. Refers to fainting or losing consciousness. 3. Refers to excluding an area from television coverage, especially of a sports event.

BLADDERED - (UK) Describes someone who is heavily intoxicated or very drunk.

BLADE - 1. Refers to a knife considered as a weapon. 2. Refers to a surgeon. 3.

Refers to a dashing young man. 4. Refers to a homosexual male.

BLAG - (UK) Refers to either a robbery or persuading someone to engage in wrongful actions.

BLAH - 1. Describes something as unstimulating, bland, or dull. 2. Expresses disagreement, contempt, etc. Can also refer to idle and meaningless talk or falsehoods and vanities.

BLAH-BLAH - Refers to incessant talking.

BLAHLY - Describes something done in a tedious, colorless way, or insipidly.

BLAME GAME - Refers to the reciprocal process of assigning blame or the ritual exchange of accusations.

BLAME SHIFTING - Refers to a tactic of always pushing fault onto another person.

BLANK - 1. Refers to a weakened or diluted narcotic or a nonnarcotic substance sold as a narcotic. 2. Refers to holding an opponent scoreless in sports.

BLANK CHECK - Refers to giving someone unrestricted authority or freedom of action.

BLANKET - 1. Refers to a pancake or hotcake. 2. Refers to a cigarette paper. 3. Refers to an overcoat.

BLANKET DRILL - Refers to sleep or sack time.

BLANKETY-BLANK (or BLANKING or BLIPPING) - A generalized euphemism substituted for a taboo or vulgar term.

BLAP - Refers to a stroke or hit. Can also mean to strike.

BLAST (or BLAST IT) - An exclamation of dismay, irritation, frustration, etc. Can also refer to a blow or a strong hit in baseball.

BLAST OFF - To ignite rockets and rise from the launchpad.

BLATHER - Refers to noisy nonsense or bullshit.

BLAXPLOITATION - The commercial exploitation of putative black experience, especially in films with blacks in sensational heroic roles.

BLAZE - 1. To speed or rush. 2. To leave or book. 3. To set alight, especially a marijuana cigarette.

BLAZE AWAY - To shoot at, either literally or figuratively.

BLAZES - Refers to blue blazes, expressing a very great degree.

BLAZING - Seductive in dress and action, frontin' or hot.

BLEACHED BLONDE - Refers to a chemically blonde person.

BLECH - An exclamation of disgust, revulsion, etc.

BLEED - To take someone's money by overcharging or extortion.

BLEED FOR SOMEONE - To feel sympathy for someone.

BLEED SOMEONE WHITE (or DRY) - To take all of someone's money, especially by extortion.

BLEEDER - 1. A lucky or weak base hit in baseball. 2. A hemophiliac.

BLEEDING HEART - A person regarded as unduly softhearted, especially towards idlers who do not merit sympathy.

BLEEP (or BLEEPING or BLIPPING) - A generalized euphemism substituted for a taboo or vulgar term.

BLETCHEROUS - Disgusting, nasty, or ugly.

BLIMEY - An expression of surprise or excitement.

BLIMP - Refers to an obese person.

BLIMP OUT - To eat too much.

BLIND - 1. Refers to being very drunk or intoxicated. 2. Refers to being uncircumcised. Can also mean completely or cold. See STEAL someone BLIND.

BLIND DATE - An arranged appointment where one's partner is a previously unknown person.

BLIND DRUNK - Refers to being very drunk.

BLIND PIG (or TIGER) - Refers to an unlicensed or illegal saloon or speakeasy.

BLIND TIGER - Another term for a blind pig or speakeasy.

BLIND-SIDE (or BLIND-POP) - 1. To tackle or block someone from an unseen quarter. 2. To be burdened or attacked unexpectedly.

BLING - Showy and expensive jewelry.

BLING-BLING - Refers to gaudy or ostentatious jewelry.

BLINGER - Something remarkable, wonderful, superior, etc.

BLINK - To blink one's eyes in a face-to-face confrontation, indicating weakness or backing down.

BLINKERS - Refers to the eyes.

BLOCKHEAD - A person who is both stupid and stubborn.

BLOOD - A term used to refer to a friend or associate.

BLOOD AND GUTS - Refers to great vigor, violence, or fierceness.

BLOOD BROTHER - Refers to a fellow black or blood companion.

BLOOD CHIT - A cloth badge worn by military aviators to identify them as American and offer a reward for aiding them.

BLOOD ON THE FLOOR - The emotional residue of an intense struggle.

BLOODY - 1. A fashionable and popular man. 2. A fellow black or blood brother. 3. (UK) Used to intensify or criticize something or someone. Also used as an exclamation of surprise, pain, frustration, or anger.

BLOODY MURDER - An expression announcing general slaughter and universal destruction. Can also refer to a shattering defeat.

BLOOM - A glare from a white object in a television image.

BLOOMER - A blunder or mistake.

BLOOMING (or BLOODY) - Used as an intensifier or expletive.

BLOOP - 1. A luminous signal on a radar screen. 2. A rapid increase and decrease. Can also mean to hit a ball weakly or launch and land a long, curving blow.

BLOOPER - 1. A blow with the fist or a high, looping pitch, throw, or hit. 2. A blunder or mistake.

BLOT SOMEONE OUT - To kill someone.

BLOTTER - 1. The daily record of arrests at a police station. 2. A sheet of absorbent paper with liquid LSD applied, used for drug consumption.

BLOTTO - Refers to being drunk or intoxicated.

BLOVIATE - To talk loudly and bombastically.

BLOVIATOR - Someone who talks at length about public issues, especially without knowledge or understanding.

BLOW (or CUT) Zs - To sleep; to go to bed.

BLOW - 1. To do or perform something, especially well. 2. Refers to cocaine. 3. (UK) Slang term for marijuana. Can also mean various actions such as playing a musical instrument, engaging in oral sex, spending money, taking narcotics, leaving, losing or ruining something, informing against someone, exposing something secret, losing one's temper, singing, and more.

BLOW A FIX - To lose the effect of a narcotic injection by missing the vein.

BLOW A GASKET - To lose one's temper, especially to the point of insanity.

BLOW AWAY - To depart or leave.

BLOW BY BLOW - In a complete and detailed way; providing a step-by-step account.

BLOW BY or PAST - To pitch a ball so hard and fast that the batter cannot hit it.

BLOW CHUNKS - The act of vomiting or throwing up.

BLOW COLD - To show disinterest or lack of enthusiasm.

BLOW HOT AND COLD - To be indecisive; to fluctuate between opposing opinions or actions.

BLOW IN - To arrive and enter, especially from a distance; to spend recklessly or squander.

BLOW IT - To fail or make a mistake; to ruin one's chances.

BLOW IT OFF - To avoid or ignore something; to neglect something deliberately.

BLOW JOB - An act of performing fellatio or cunnilingus; or oral sex performed on a man.

BLOW OFF - To avoid or shirk; to ignore or neglect; to rebuff or treat dismissively.

BLOW OFF ONE'S MOUTH - To shoot off one's mouth; to talk boastfully or excessively.

BLOW ONE'S COOL - To lose one's composure; become flustered, excited, or angry.

BLOW ONE'S CORK - To lose control; go insane; become violently mad.

BLOW ONE'S LINES - To perform badly, especially by misspeaking, in a theatrical context.

BLOW ONE'S OWN HORN - To boast or brag about one's achievements or abilities.

BLOW ONE'S TOP - To lose one's temper; to become violently angry.

BLOW SMOKE - To boast, exaggerate, mislead, or flatter.

BLOW SOMEONE AWAY - To kill or assassinate someone; to defeat someone utterly; to astonish or impress someone profoundly.

BLOW SOMEONE OFF - To rebuff or slight someone; to treat someone dismissively.

BLOW SOMEONE TO SOMETHING - To treat someone to something.

BLOW SOMEONE'S BRAINS OUT - To kill someone with a gun.

BLOW SOMEONE'S DOORS OFF - To utterly defeat or surpass someone.

BLOW SOMEONE'S MIND - To evoke deep feelings of awe, admiration, strangeness, etc.; to profoundly stir someone.

BLOW SOMEONE'S OR SOMETHING'S COVER - To ruin or nullify someone's disguise or assumed role; to reveal someone's true identity or reveal something inadvertently.

BLOW SOMEONE'S SOCKS OFF - To astonish or impress someone greatly.

BLOW SOMETHING UP - To assign too much importance to something; to exaggerate or make a big deal out of something.

BLOW SOMETHING WIDE OPEN - To expose a scandal, especially political or governmental corruption; to reveal or discover significant information.

BLOW THE GAFF - To inform on someone; to reveal a concealed cheating mechanism or secret.

BLOW THE JOINT - To leave a place, especially quickly.

BLOW THE LID OFF - To expose a scandal, especially political or governmental corruption.

BLOW THE WHISTLE - To inform or expose wrongdoing; to reveal hidden information or secrets.

BLOW TOWN - To leave a place, especially in a hurry.

BLOW UP - To enlarge a photograph; to become angry or lose one's temper; to forget or garble one's lines on stage.

BLOW UP A STORM - To play a musical instrument skillfully and with great verve; to have a vigorous and intense conversation or argument.

BLOWER - A supercharger for a car or airplane engine.

BLOWER - Slang term for a telephone.

BLOWHARD - A braggart; someone who talks loudly and boastfully.

BLOWN - Having a supercharger, typically referring to a car engine.

BLOWN AWAY - Overwhelmed; extremely impressed.

BLOWN-OUT - In a state of narcotic intoxication, trance, or exhilaration.

BLOWOFF - A climax; a final provocation; a quarrel; something very easy.

BLOWUP - A fit of anger; a quarrel; a photographic or other enlargement.

BLT - An acronym for a bacon, lettuce, and tomato sandwich.

BLUBBER - Fat; to weep or cry.

BLUBBER BUTT - A very fat person, especially one with big buttocks.

BLUBBERHEAD - A stupid person.

BLUDGER - (AU) Describes a lazy person or someone who avoids work.

BLUE - Drunk; lewd or suggestive; melancholy or depressed; very dark-skinned; a police officer; an IBM computer.

BLUE AROUND THE GILLS - Looking ill or nauseous; appearing pale or sickly.

BLUE BALLS - A condition of testicular congestion and pain due to sexual excitement and frustration; also used to refer to various venereal diseases.

BLUE BLANKET - A personal possession that gives a sense of safety or security.

BLUE BLAZES - An expression used to intensify a statement; hell.

BLUE BOMB or BOMBER - A tablet of Halcion™, a sleeping pill.

BLUE BOX - An electronic device that enables making long-distance telephone calls without paying.

BLUE CHEER - LSD.

BLUE CHIPPER - A person or thing of the highest quality or ability, especially an athlete.

BLUE DARTER - A low, hard-hit line drive in baseball.

BLUE DEVILS - 1. Low spirits or depression. 2. Delirium tremens.

BLUE DOG - An economic conservative in the Democratic Party.

BLUE FLAGS - LSD.

BLUE FLICK - A blue movie or pornographic film.

BLUE FLU - A situation where police officers call in sick as part of a job action.

BLUE FUNK - 1. Profoundly timorous or nervous state. 2. Profoundly depressed state.

BLUE HEAVEN or BLUE-DEVIL - A capsule of Amytal™, a type of barbiturate.

BLUE HELL - An extremely difficult or trying situation.

BLUE ICE - Wastewater discharged from aircraft in flight that freezes on the way to the ground.

BLUE IN THE FACE - To argue or explain something exhaustively or to the point of futility.

BLUE MEANIE - 1. A very nasty person. 2. Depression or melancholy.

BLUE MOVIE (or FLICK) - A pornographic movie or erotic film.

BLUE MURDER - A cry or expression of protest or outrage.

BLUE NOTE - A flatted note commonly used in blues music.

BLUE RUIN - Inferior gin.

BLUE SCREEN OF DEATH - A fatal error message that appears on a Windows operating system.

BLUE SKY - 1. Speculation or guesswork. 2. Heroin.

BLUE STATE - A U.S. state that tends to vote for Democratic party candidates.

BLUE STREAK (LIKE A BLUE STREAK) - In a very rapid or excessive manner.

BLUE VEINER - A very stiff penile erection.

BLUE VELVET - A mixture of paregoric with Pyrabenzamine™, an antihistamine used as an injection.

BLUE-AND-WHITE - A police car, especially in New York City.

BLUE-BALL - A sexually frustrated male.

BLUE-CHIP - Of the best sort; first-rate.

BLUE-COLLAR - Relating to working-class individuals or jobs.

BLUE-COLLAR BALLET - Professional wrestling.

BLUE-DEVIL - Depression or melancholy.

BLUE-LIGHT SPECIAL - A bargain or good buy.

BLUE-SKY - Having no sound factual or value basis; recklessly imaginative.

BLUEBOOK - A college examination.

BLUECOAT - A police officer.

BLUED - Screwed, blued, and tattooed; in a difficult or unpleasant situation.

BLUEGRASS - A genre of music based on songs and dances of the Southern Appalachians, played at a fast tempo by a string group.

BLUENOSE - A native of Nova Scotia, especially a Maritimes fisherman.

BLUENOSE - A prude or self-appointed moral arbiter.

BLUES - 1. A state of melancholy or depression. 2. A genre of music expressing the hardships of life and love, originating from black culture. 3. The police.

BLUFF - To use confident pretense as a means of winning or succeeding; a false show of confidence.

BLUNT - A marijuana-filled cigar, created by hollowing out a cigar and replacing the tobacco with marijuana.

BLUNT - Slang term for a cannabis cigarette.

BOAT ANCHOR - An old or useless computer, or anything clunky and useless.

BOAT PEOPLE - Political refugees who escape by small boat.

BOB - 1. A shorthand for various terms such as boob job or nose job. 2. Also used to refer to a Bedouin or Iraqi. 3. (UK) Something that is unfair or disliked.

BOB AND WEAVE - To behave evasively or adapt to changing circumstances.

BOB'S YOUR UNCLE - An expression indicating that everything is all right or completed successfully.

BOBBER - A type of headband accessory.

BOBBITTRY - Militant feminism advocating extreme measures, such as sexual mutilation of males.

BOBFOC - Acronym for "Body Off Baywatch, Face Off Crimewatch." Refers to a woman with an attractive body but an unattractive face.

BOBTAIL - 1. A dishonorable discharge from the military. 2. A truck tractor without a semitrailer.

BOCHE - A German, especially a soldier.

BOD - 1. A person. 2. The body or physique.

BODACIOUS - Extreme or excellent; admirable.

BODACIOUS TA-TAS - Prominent and attractive breasts.

BODEGA - 1. A liquor store. 2. A grocery store, especially in Puerto Rican areas of New York City.

BODICE-RIPPER - A romantic-erotic novel, often with a historical plot.

BODY - A reference to knowing where the bodies are buried or a warm body, indicating knowledge or presence.

BODY AND SOUL - One's boyfriend or girlfriend.

BODY BAG - A type of heroin. Also used metaphorically to refer to a situation or action leading to certain death or failure.

BODY COUNT - 1. The total number of casualties after a conflict. 2. The total number of people affected in a shakeup or bad situation. 3. The total number of people

present.

BODY PACKER - A person who swallows drugs, typically heroin, encased in containers to transport them.

BODY SHAKE - A thorough search of someone's body, often performed by security personnel.

BODY-UP - To be aggressive or muscular.

BOFF - 1. A blow with the fist or open hand. 2. A sexual act or coupling. 3. A laugh or a joke. 4. A successful show or entertainment.

BOFFER - A man who engages in sexual acts.

BOFFIN - An expert, particularly in a scientific or technical field.

BOFFO - 1. A loud appreciative laugh. 2. A joke or remark that provokes such laughter. 3. Highly favorable or laudatory.

BOG DOWN - To become helpless or immobile, as if mired in a bog.

BOG STANDARD - Describes something that is ordinary, average, or lacks exceptional qualities.

BOGAN - (AU) Refers to someone perceived as lower class, lacking taste and social graces.

BOGART - 1. To behave truculently or intimidate someone. 2. To consume more than one's fair share, especially of a marijuana cigarette.

BOGEY - 1. A police officer. 2. An enemy aircraft, especially an attacking fighter plane. 3. A golf score of one stroke over par on a given hole.

BOGSATT - In need of narcotics or suffering from deprivation. Can also mean false or fake.

BOGUE - 1. Disgusting or unattractive. 2. A cigarette. 3. To smoke a cigarette.

BOGUE OUT - To become false, misleading, useless, or untrustworthy.

BOGUS - 1. False, fake, or counterfeit. 2. Ignorant, unattractive, or out-of-date. 3. Not to be trusted or false in any way.

BOHEME - A female style of comportment characterized by loose funky clothing, comfortable shoes, and no make-up.

BOHO - 1. An ineffectual person or loser. 2. A person who is outdated or behind the times.

BOHUNK - 1. An immigrant from central or eastern Europe, typically from Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary, or Poland. 2. A stupid or clumsy person.

BOIL DOWN - To reduce something to its essential elements.

BOIL OVER - To lose one's temper.

BOIL SOMEONE IN OIL - To punish or rebuke someone severely.

BOIL THE OCEAN - To waste one's time on an impossible task.

BOILED - 1. Drunk. 2. Angry.

BOILED SHIRT - 1. A dress shirt, especially with a starched front. 2. Stiff, chilly, and pompous behavior; stuffiness.

BOILER - A potboiler, referring to a book or movie of low artistic value produced purely for financial gain.

BOILER ROOM - 1. A site of illegal operations, often involving fraudulent telephone sales. 2. A shady and provocative gathering place.

BOILERMAKER - 1. A drink of whiskey with or in a glass of beer. 2. Any very strong or rough drink.

BOING - An exclamation of appreciative delight and intentness at the sight of an attractive woman. Also used as a verb to refer to the act of having sex.

BOINKABLE - Able, willing, and desirable for copulation.

BOLL WEEVIL - A conservative Democratic politician from the southern United States.

BONK - 1. A blow. 2. A single sex act. 3. (UK) used as a verb to refer to hitting or having sex with someone.

BONKERS - Synonymous with mad, crazy, or insane.

BOO - 1. Excellent or remarkable. Also used to refer to marijuana or another narcotic. 2. An exclamation of disapproval or as a frightening exclamation.

BOO-BOO - An error or misstep, especially one with embarrassing consequences.

BOO-WORD - A word or phrase that frightens.

BOOB (1960s+) - A slang term for a breast.

BOOB - 1. A stupid person. 2. A woman's breast. 3. A blunder or error. 4. (UK) Slang term for a prison or jail.

BOOB, TIT (1960s+) - Synonyms for a breast.

BOOB00 - Refers to a mistake or an error.

BOOBY HATCH - 1. An insane asylum or mental hospital. 2. A police station.

BOOBY TRAP - 1. A hidden explosive charge set off by an ordinary act. 2. A seemingly harmless appearance that conceals vexations for an unsuspecting opponent.

BOOGAL00 or BUGAL00 - Voodoo music or a good time; a shuffling dance.

BOOGER or BOOGIE - Nasal mucus.

BOOGERED or BOOGERED UP - Damaged or inoperable.

BOOGIE BOARD - Skateboard or surfboard.

BOOGIE BOX - Ghetto box, a loud stereo cassette player.

BOOGIE DOWN - To go somewhere in a hurry.

BOOGIE or BOOGEY - Hairstyle or music style; syphilis or a black person; vulva or enemy aircraft; solid mucus from the nose; to move or go; to carry on jocularly; to engage in sexual activity.

BOOGIE-WOOGIE - Fast jazz piano style or to enjoy oneself thoroughly.

BOOGIEMAN or BOGEYMAN - Imaginary scary person or monster.

BOOK - Bookie or a bookmaker; to engage or reserve in advance; to charge someone with a crime; to run or depart.

BOOK IT - To depart quickly or be confident of something.

BOOK, THE - Instructions or conventional wisdom about someone's performance.

BOOK-SMARTS - Learning or erudition.

BOOKEND - Two parts of a television commercial separated by other unrelated commercials; to precede and follow.

BOOKIE - Person who accepts and handles bets on horse races.

BOOKMARK - To make a note of something mentally or in writing.

BOOLA-BOOLA - Noisy partisan support for one's college teams.

BOOM - Wonderful or fashionable; marijuana; to flourish or promote aggressively.

BOOM BOX - A loud stereo cassette player.

BOOM STICKS - Drumsticks.

BOOM-BOOM - Sexual activity or copulation.

BOOMER - Migratory worker, railroad or construction worker, womanizer, or baby boomer.

BOOMERANG - To return to the parental nest.

BOOMERANG BABY - A child who returns to the parental home after college or mature training.

BOOMERS - Slang term for magic mushrooms or psilocybin mushrooms.

BOOMING - Excellent or playing loud bass tones on a stereo.

BOOMLET - A minor upsurge or small access of vigor.

BOOMSHAKALAKA - An impudent exclamation.

BOON COON - See ACE BOON COON.

BOONDOCK - Suitable for rough outdoor use.

BOONDOCKS - Remote places or rural regions.

BOONDOGGLE - To spend public funds outlandishly or on futile activity.

BOONIE RAT - Combat soldier, especially an infantry private.

BOOSHWAH - See BUSHWAH.

BOOST - To steal or praise highly.

BOOSTER - Shoplifter, huckster's or auctioneer's assistant, or a person who praises extravagantly.

BOOT - To kick, discharge, lose or waste, commit an error, or inject a narcotic gradually.

BOOT CAMP - Basic training center, penal camp, or any strict training facility.

BOOT PARTY - Savagely kicking an offender as a form of punishment.

BOOT SOMEONE OUT - To kick or throw someone out.

BOOT STRAPPER - A self-made person who succeeds by their own efforts.

BOOT UP - To start up or input a computer's operating system.

BOOT, THE - Dismissal or discharge.

BOOT-HO - Derogatory term for an unpleasant yet sexually attractive woman.

BOOTED - Intoxicated by narcotics.

BOOTLEG - Illegally made or sold whiskey or other products; to make or sell illegal products or carry the ball deceptively.

BOOTLEGGER - A person who bootlegs.

BOOTLICK - To serve and flatter a superior.

BOOTS - Bootblack or a hotel bootblack.

BOOTY - The female body as a sex object, vulva, or sex act.

BOOTY CALL - Sexual arousal or desire for a sex partner; a telephone call to seek a sex partner.

BOOYAH - An impudent exclamation or an excited exclamation of extreme pleasure.

BOOZE - Any alcoholic drink, especially whiskey and other spirits.

BOOZE ARTIST - A drunk person or drunkard.

BOOZE IT (UP) - To drink a great deal of liquor.

BOOZE UP - To drink a great deal of liquor.

BOOZE-UP - A drinking spree; BINGE.

BOOZED or BOOZED UP - Drunk.

BOOZEHOUND or BOOZE-FIGHTER - A person who habitually drinks a great deal of whiskey.

BOOZER - A heavy drinker.

BOOZERY - A saloon, especially an illegal or after-hours saloon; SPEAKEASY.

BOOZY - Drunk.

BOP (or BOPPER) GLASSES - Horn-rimmed spectacles.

BOP - 1. A bop musician. 2. A fight among gangs; RUMBLE. 3. The sex act; SCREW. 4. A style of modern jazz characterized by complex harmonies, sudden changes in register, the use of fast and nearly unintelligible lyrics, etc.

BOPPER - A person who enjoys socializing with wealthy and famous individuals.

BOPPING - Tampering with taxicab meters to register illegally high charges.

BOPPY - Bouncy; zesty; JAZZY.

BORAX - 1. Cheap or inferior material; shoddy merchandise. 2. Exaggeration; misrepresentation; HORSESHIT. 3. Any gaudy item; tasteless bric-a-brac.

BORDER - See SOUTH OF THE BORDER.

BORE THE PANTS OFF SOMEONE - To thoroughly bore or weary.

BORED OUT OF ONE'S SKULL - BORED TO DEATH.

BORED STIFF - BORED TO DEATH.

BORED TO DEATH - Extremely bored.

BORK - To mount an intense campaign against a political appointee; BUSHWHACK.

BORN LOSER - See LOSER.

BORN TO - Seemingly destined and compelled to perform something indicated.

BORSCHT BELT - 1. The region in and near the Catskill Mountains north of New York City where many predominantly Jewish resort hotels are found. 2. Any neighborhood peopled by Russians or Russian emigrants.

BORSCHT CIRCUIT - The resort hotels of the Catskills Borscht Belt, regarded as a circuit for entertainers, lecturers, etc.

BOSH - Nonsense; poppycock; BULLSHIT.

BOSOM BUDDY - A very close friend; best friend; MAIN MAN.

BOSS - 1. Excellent; wonderful; the MOST. 2. The chief; the person in charge. 3. The head of a political machine.

BOSS SOMEONE AROUND - To direct or control someone in an offensively authoritarian way.

BOSS TRICK - See CHAMPAGNE TRICK.

BOSSY - Domineering; autocratic.

BOTH HANDS - A ten-year prison sentence.

BOTH SIDES OF THE DESK - The faculty and students of a school or university.

BOTH SIDES OF THE STREET - See WORK BOTH SIDES OF THE STREET.

BOTH WAYS - See HAVE IT BOTH WAYS, SWING BOTH WAYS, WORK BOTH WAYS.

BOTHERED - See HOT AND BOTHERED.

BOTTLE - 1. A bottle or bottle's amount of liquor; JUG. 2. A glass insulator for electric or communications lines. 3. A vacuum tube. 4. Liquor; BOOZE.

BOTTLE BABY - A derelict alcoholic; Skid Row Bum.

BOTTLE CLUB - A social club where members may drink after legal hours.

BOTTOM - The buttocks; ASS.

BOTTOM DOLLAR - See BET one's BOTTOM DOLLAR, BET YOUR BOOTS.

BOTTOM DROPPED OUT, THE - The market collapsed; disaster struck.

BOTTOM FEEDER - 1. A despicable, predatory person who exploits and fancies the squalid; SCUM-SUCKER, SLEAZEBAG. 2. A person or company that deliberately exploits those in difficulty and profits by their poverty or misfortune.

BOTTOM FEEDER - A person or organization of low quality or standards.

BOTTOM FISHING - The activity of investing in securities when it is believed the market has reached bottom following a major decline; searching for investment bargains.

BOTTOM LINE - 1. The bookkeeping figure showing profit or loss. 2. The result of any computation or estimate, especially one showing total costs. 3. Any final decision or judgment. 4. A fundamental or crucial point of fact; the essence; the NITTY-GRITTY.

BOTTOM MAN ON THE TOTEM POLE - See LOW MAN ON THE TOTEM POLE.

BOTTOM OF THE BARREL - See SCRAPE THE BOTTOM OF THE BARREL.

BOTTOM OUT - To get as low or bad as possible; reach nadir.

BOTTOM WOMAN - The best-patronized and most dependable woman in a pimp's covey of prostitutes.

BOTTOM-END - The crankshaft, main bearing, and connecting-rod bearings of an automobile engine.

BOTTOM-FEEDING - Showing the instincts and practice of a bottom feeder.

BOTTOMLESS - 1. Wearing nothing; nude. 2. A bar, club, restaurant, etc, featuring unclad females.

BOTTOMLESS PIT - 1. A voracious and insatiable person. 2. An infinite resource of something. 3. Something that drains all one's resources or causes infinite trouble.

BOTTOMS UP - Drink up! Cheers!

BOUNCE - (UK) Slang term meaning "go away" or to leave.

BOUNCE - 1. Energy; vitality; PISS AND VINEGAR, PIZZAZZ. 2. A prison sentence. 3. A sudden and sometimes brief increase in rating, popularity, value, etc. 4. To expel; throw out. 5. To discharge or dismiss; FIRE. 6. To be rejected for lack of funds in the bank. 7. To intimidate; bully; ROUST.

BOUNCE BACK - To recover; return to action.

BOUNCE FOR or SPRING FOR - To pay for; treat; PICK UP THE TAB.

BOUNCE OFF THE WALLS - Be in a nervous and confused condition; be hyper.

BOUNCE SOMETHING AROUND - To think about and discuss an idea, project, etc.

BOUNCE SOMETHING OFF SOMEONE - To try out an idea or scheme by seeing how someone reacts; seek a quick evaluation.

BOUNCE, THE - 1. Forcible ejection, especially by a person hired to remove unwanted customers; the BUM'S RUSH. 2. A dismissal, polite or otherwise; KISS-OFF.

BOUNCE-ON - A sex act; a copulation; FUCK, SCREW.

BOUNCER - 1. A person employed to eject unwanted customers from a saloon, restaurant, dance hall, etc. 2. A check that is returned for lack of funds; RUBBER CHECK.

BOUNCY-BOUNCY - The sex act.

BOW OUT - To depart, voluntarily and often gracefully.

BOW TIE - A brushback in baseball, referring to a pitch thrown near a batter's head as a form of intimidation.

BOW-AND-ARROW SQUAD - A police assignment involving unarmed duty.

BOWERY BUM - Skid Row Bum.

BOWSER - A person with a doglike or ugly face.

BOWWOW - 1. A dog. 2. An unattractive or obnoxious young woman. 3. A frankfurter.

BOX - 1. Dead. 2. A coffin. 3. A safe or bank vault. 4. The vulva or vagina. 5. The male genitals, especially as displayed by tight pants. 6. Any stringed instrument, especially a guitar. 7. An accordion. 8. A phonograph. 9. A very tight and awkward situation or bind.

BOX LUNCH - Cunnilingus.

BOX MAN - 1. A criminal specializing in opening safes; also known as a "Pete man." 2. A professional blackjack or twenty-one dealer. 3. A cashier or croupier at a gambling table.

BOX ON THE TABLE - To die on a medical operating or examining table.

BOX SOMEONE IN - To put someone in a tight and awkward situation; incapacitate someone.

BOXED OUT - Totally free and uninhibited, especially due to narcotic intoxication.

BOY - 1. An exclamation of amazement, shock, happiness, or intensification. 2. A black man. 3. Any male working as a porter, elevator operator, etc. 4. A male who takes the subservient role in a homosexual relationship. 5. Heroin.

BOY RACER - A young man who drives aggressively and at high speeds.

BOY-TOY or BOYTOY - 1. A young woman used like the plaything of a man. 2. A young man used like the plaything of a woman or man.

BOYCHIK or BOYCHICK - A boy or youngster.

BOYO - A fellow, man, or friend.

BOYS - 1. Any group of men, especially drinking companions or poker players. 2. A group of criminals or disreputable individuals.

BOYS IN THE BACKROOM - A group of men, especially politicians and their aides, who control the inner workings of an enterprise or place.

BOYS UPTOWN - 1. The political bosses of a city and their staffs; City Hall. 2. Any group of influential and unnamed criminals.

BOZETTE - A girl or woman, especially a somewhat vulgar or bimbo-like female.

BOZO - A fellow or man, especially a muscular type with a meager brain.

BOZO FILTER - A desirable but nonexistent device that would automatically exclude fools and louts from computer networks; also, any way of avoiding annoying people or emails.

BRABURNER - A very militant feminist.

BRACE - 1. A very stiff and exaggerated standing at military attention. 2. To stop or approach a person and beg for money. 3. To confront someone with an accusation.

BRACELET - A radio transmitter in a band worn on the ankle to monitor the wearer's whereabouts.

BRACELETS - Handcuffs.

BRACER - A drink of liquor.

BRACKET CREEP - The raising of wage earners into higher income-tax brackets, especially due to wage raises triggered by inflation.

BRAG-RAGS - Fruit salad.

BRAGGING RIGHTS - The privilege of boasting about one's accomplishments; the warrant of superiority.

BRAID - Gold braid.

BRAIN - 1. An intelligent person, intellectual, or good scholar. 2. To injure with a hard blow to the head.

BRAIN BUCKET - 1. A steel helmet. 2. A hard hat.

BRAIN DISH - A helmet worn for motorcycling, bicycling, in-line skating, etc.

BRAIN DRAIN - The loss of useful educated persons, especially professionals, to better conditions elsewhere.

BRAIN DUMP - To talk, explain, or expatiate.

BRAIN FART - When one momentarily loses track of what they are saying and utters something nonsensical.

BRAIN ONE - The most elementary intelligence or minimum sagacity.

BRAIN SURGEON - A term used to imply that a task or activity does not require advanced skills or expertise, suggesting that it is not difficult or complex.

BRAIN SURGERY - Anything very difficult and technical. It can also refer to a task that is not brain surgery but requires careful handling or precision.

BRAIN TABLET - A slang term for a cigarette.

BRAIN WAVE - A sudden and useful idea, similar to a brainstorm.

BRAIN-BURNED or -FRIED - 1. Mentally impaired from drug-taking. 2. Unable to efficiently function mentally due to tiredness.

BRAIN-FADE - Stuporous boredom or tedium; becoming confused or losing coherence.

BRAIN-PICKER - A person who exploits the creative notions of others.

BRAIN-TAP - An instance of brain-picking, likely derived from the medical operation called "spinal tap."

BRAIN-TEASER - A puzzle or a hard and tricky question.

BRAINCHILD - Someone's great idea; a product of creative thinking.

BRAINDEAD - Stupid or dumb.

BRAINERY - A college or university.

BRAINIAC - A highly intelligent individual, sometimes used sarcastically to refer to someone very foolish.

BRAINS - 1. Intelligence, mind, or savvy. 2. The person who does the thinking and planning; guiding mind.

BRAINSTORM - A sudden, useful idea or happy insight. It can also refer to the process of examining and working on a problem by having a group spontaneously share relevant thoughts.

BRAINWASH - To cause profound attitudinal changes in someone, often through psychological conditioning and other methods. It can also refer to changing or influencing someone's opinions or attitudes using less stringent methods.

BRAINY - Intelligent and sagacious.

BRAKES - Refers to "standing on one's brakes," meaning to suddenly apply the brakes on a vehicle.

BRAND SPANKING NEW - Describes something that is completely new.

BRAND X - 1. Refers to the infantry insignia of crossed rifles. 2. Slang for marijuana.

BRANNIGAN - 1. A spree or prolonged crossword puzzle. 2. A brawl or fracas.

BRAP - (UK) Expresses something as being very good or excellent.

BRASS - (UK) Slang term for money or cash.

BRASS - 1. Impudence or effrontery. 2. Money. 3. High officials or managers in general.

BRASS BALLS - Courage, audacity, or guts.

BRASS HAT - 1. A high-ranking officer in the military or other uniformed services. 2. Any high-ranking official, manager, chief, or boss.

BRASS MONKEY - Refers to very cold weather, not a nautical term as widely believed.

BRASS TACKS - Refers to getting down to the essentials or important details of a matter.

BRASSED OFF - Feeling ready to quit, sated, bored, or fed up.

BRASSIC - (UK) Slang term for being without money or cash.

BRAT - 1. A child, especially an obnoxious or troublesome one. 2. Bratwurst, a kind of sausage.

BRAT PACK - A group of young metropolitan males deemed worthy of media attention.

BRAT-SIT - Slang term for babysitting.

BRAVER THAN DICK TRACY - Audacious or too brave for one's own good.

BRAWL - Refers to a noisy, riotous party.

BRAZILIAN - Refers to a technique in which all or most of the pubic hair is removed with a hot-wax treatment.

BREAD - Slang for money or dough.

BREAD AND BUTTER - Refers to the simple necessities of life or basic needs.

BREADBASKET - Slang term for the stomach or abdomen.

BREADY - Describes something that is white and bread-like.

BREAK (OR BUST) CHOPS - To verbally assault or harass someone.

BREAK - 1. Refers to an escape or attempt to escape. 2. A brief period of rest or relaxation. 3. A stroke of luck, good or bad. 4. An improvised passage, solo, or lick in music. 5. To interrupt or abandon some regular practice. 6. To happen or occur. 7. To tame a wild horse or subdue someone's spirit. 8. To bankrupt a company or person. 9. To separate, especially from a clinch. 10. To do a kind of dancing evolved in inner-city ghettos, close to the floor. 11. To win a game from an opponent who is serving.

BREAK - An opportunity or stroke of good luck.

BREAK A LEG - An expression used to wish someone good luck.

BREAK A SWEAT - To perspire from exercise or exertion.

BREAK BAD - To become hostile and menacing.

BREAK ONE'S ARM PATTING ONESELF ON THE BACK - To be very self-gratulatory or bask in smugness.

BREAK ONE'S ASS - To work very hard or exert oneself.

BREAK SOMEONE'S BALLS - 1. To give someone a hard time or nag them. 2. To overwork or be overworked.

BREAK SOMEONE'S BRAINS - To injure someone severely.

BREAK SOMETHING DOWN - To explain something or present it in detail.

BREAK THE BANK - To use all or most of the available money or resources for something.

BREAK THE ICE - To dissipate the sense of strain among people who do not know each other.

BREAK THE POINTS - To score enough points to cover the point spread in sports or gambling.

BREAK THE SEAL - Urinating for the first time during a drinking session.

BREAK UP - 1. To separate or cause separation or dissolution of a close relationship. 2. To laugh uncontrollably or cause laughter.

BREAK WIND - To flatulate or fart; or to release gas through the anus, often

referred to as farting.

BREAKAWAY - 1. Unconventional or rebellious. 2. Made to break or collapse easily.

BREAKDANCE - A style of dancing that evolved in the inner-city ghettos, characterized by intricate writhings, balance, and strength close to the floor.

BREAKER - A person who dances with intricate movements close to the floor, often to rhythmic, staccato songs spoken rather than sung.

BREAKFAST - Refers to various expressions related to breakfast, such as "from hell to breakfast" or "breakfast of champions."

BREAKUP - A separation or dissolution.

BREASTWORKS - Slang term for the female breasts or bazoom.

BREATHE EASY - To be relieved of concern or relax.

BREATHER - 1. A person who makes harassing telephone calls and merely breathes into the mouthpiece. 2. Someone who is alive.

BREED-UP - To impregnate a woman or make her pregnant.

BREEDER - Refers to individuals who have children or engage in procreation.

BREKKIE - Slang term for breakfast.

BRICKLAYER - An inaccurate basketball shooter.

BRICKS - The streets and sidewalks of a city.

BRICKS AND MORTAR - Buildings and construction, especially as an item of expenditure and administrative emphasis for an institution.

BRICKTOP - A redheaded person.

BRICKYARD - The motor speedway at Indianapolis, Indiana, known for the annual 500-mile race.

BRIDESMAID SYNDROME - The misfortune of being very close but never the winner.

BRIG - 1. The detention cell of a ship. 2. A naval prison. 3. Any military jail or prison.

BRIG RAT - A military prisoner.

BRIGHT - Daytime.

BRIGHT AS A BURNED OUT LIGHTBULB - Describes someone who is very unintelligent.

BRIGHT-EYED AND BUSHY-TAILED - Eager and energetic.

BRIGHT-LINE - To single out, focus on, or emphasize something.

BRIGHTS - The bright or upper-beam headlights of a car.

BRILL - Brilliant or excellent.

BRILLO OR BRILLO-PAD - A black person. Derived from the brand of scouring pad with wiry fibers resembling curly hair.

BRIM - A hat.

BRING (OR GET OR KEEP) SOMEONE UP TO SPEED - To give necessary information or fill someone in.

BRING DOWN THE HOUSE - To score a resounding theatrical success.

BRING HOME THE BACON - 1. To achieve a tangible goal or task. 2. To earn enough to support oneself and one's family.

BRING IT - 1. To throw a baseball fast. 2. To play very well or do the job.

BRING MONEY - Refers to something expensive or costly.

BRING SCUNNION (OR SMOKE) - 1. To inspire fear or anxiety in others. 2. To concentrate fire, especially artillery fire.

BRING SOMEONE DOWN - To depress, dispirit, or sadden someone.

BRING SOMEONE ON - To arouse sexually.

BRING SOMETHING TO A SCREECHING HALT - To end or cease something immediately.

BRING SOMETHING UP - 1. To introduce into the conversation or mention. 2. To vomit or cough up.

BRINGDOWN - 1. A cutting rebuke or comment; a deflation. 2. A disappointing or depressing performance. 3. A morose person.

BRINY - The ocean or sea.

BRIT - British.

BRO' OR BRO - 1. Brother. 2. A black person. 3. A man or guy.

BROAD - 1. A woman. 2. A promiscuous woman or prostitute.

BROAD STROKES - General details or basic facts.

BROAD-ASSED OR BROAD-BEAMED - Wide in the buttocks.

BROAD-GAUGE - Very versatile and competent.

BRODIE - 1. A fall or tumble. 2. A total failure or fiasco. 3. A mistake. 4. A skidding of a motorcycle or car.

BROKE - Entirely out of money or destitute.

BROKE TO THE CURB - Ugly or ill-favored.

BROKEN ARROW - An accident involving nuclear weapons.

BROKEN RECORD - Something or someone repetitive, tedious, and importunate.

BROKEN-BAT BLEEDER - A weak blow on which the hitter breaks his bat, and it trickles out for a hit.

BROKEN-NOSE CROWD - The organized-crime syndicates or mob.

BROLLY - An umbrella.

BROMIDE - 1. An old, stale joke or scrap of wisdom. 2. A boring or tedious person.

BRONC OR BRONK - 1. Bronco. 2. A catamite or punk.

BRONCO - A young male not accustomed to nor complaisant in homosexual relations.

BRONCO BUSTER - 1. A cowboy who tames broncos to riding. 2. A rodeo performer who rides unruly horses in competition.

BRONX CHEER - 1. A loud, rude, flatulating noise made with the tongue and lips. 2. Any outright and precise expression of derision.

BROOKIE - A brook trout.

BROOKLYN SIDE - The left side of the bowling alley as one faces the pins.

BROOM - To run or walk away, especially to escape by running.

BROTHAFEST - A celebration of Southern rural culture.

BROTHER - 1. An exclamation of surprise, amusement, or vehemence. 2. A man, fellow, or guy. 3. A black person or blood. 4. A fellow professional or colleague.

BS - Polite expression used instead of "bullshit" to convey disbelief or nonsense.

BUB - A term used to refer to a man, fellow, brother, or guy, often with a slightly insulting intent. It can be used in direct address.

BUBBA (1860s+ Southern) - 1. A nickname for a brother. 2. A person of simple Southern rural culture, similar to a cracker or good old boy.

BUBBA JONES (1860s+ Southern) - A nickname for someone named Bubba, often used in the Southern region.

BUBBA, also often Bubba (1980s+) - A person of simple Southern rural culture, especially during the early years of the Clinton administration.

BUCK (1850s+) - 1. A dollar. 2. A hundred dollars, especially as a bet. 3. A buck private. 4. A Roman Catholic priest. 5. A young male Indian or Native American brave. 6. A young black man. 7. Any young man, especially a strong and spirited one.

BUCK (verb) (1850s+) - 1. To resist, defy, or go up against. 2. To work for personal advancement or aspire eagerly. 3. To pass along a letter, memorandum, problem, etc., without taking action.

BUFF (To do a psychiatric evaluation) - To do a psychiatric evaluation; pronounce one insane.

BUFF (To do body-building) - To do body-building; put on muscle; become brawnier.

BUFF (Well-built) - Well-built; muscular.

BUFF - A devotee or enthusiast; hobbyist.

BUFF BOD - Refers to a body that is in excellent physical shape.

BUFFALO (Anal Intercourse) - A male with a taste for anal intercourse; sodomite.

BULLDOG - The earliest daily edition of a newspaper.

BULLDOZE - To intimidate; overcome by force.

BULLDOZER - A person who bulldozes.

BULLET - 1. An ace (1807+ Card games) 2. Money; dollars (1900+ Underworld) 3. A rivet (WWII aircraft workers) 4. Anything thrown or hit so as to travel very fast, especially a baseball 5. BURNED (OR BURNT) OUT - 1. Tired; exhausted; pooped. 2. At the end of one's vigor and productivity; played out. 3. Depressed and exhausted after the effects of a narcotic have worn off.

BURNED - Drunk.

BURNED-OUT (OR BURNT-OUT) CASE - A person who is exhausted and ineffectual; burnout.

BURNER - 1. The electric chair. 2. A superlative performer; the tops. 3. A pistol, especially a .22-caliber revolver.

BURNIE - 1. A partially smoked marijuana cigarette. 2. A marijuana cigarette shared

among smokers.

BURNING OUT - An older addict's voluntary withdrawal from narcotics after years of use.

BURNOUT - 1. Total and incapacitating exhaustion; inability to go on. 2. Boredom; apathy; satiation.

BURP - 1. A belch, especially a gentle one. 2. To cause a baby to belch, especially by holding it over the shoulder and patting its back.

BURR UNDER THE SADDLE (or UP ONE'S REAR END) - A constant annoyance; obsessive nuisance.

BURSTING AT THE SEAMS - Too full; almost beyond capacity.

BURY - To sentence someone to a very long prison term or to solitary confinement. To defeat decisively; clobber.

BURY THE HATCHET - To make peace; cease hostilities.

BUS - A car. An aircraft. An ambulance. To clear dirty dishes and tableware from restaurant tables.

BUSBOY - A person who clears dirty dishes and tableware from restaurant tables.

BUSCAR - Borrowed money. Unexpected or forbidden pleasure; boodle.

BUSH - Rural; provincial; bush league. Mediocre; second-rate; amateur. A beard; whiskers. The pubic hair, especially of a female. To fatigue; exhaust; sap; poop. The back country; the boonies.

BUSH LEAGUE - Mediocre; second- or third-rate; bush, small-time. A baseball minor league of professional or semiprofessional players. Any subordinate, apprentice, or amateur enterprise.

BUSH PATROL - Hugging and kissing; necking. The sex act; copulation.

BUSHBOY - A young, new, and naive prisoner.

BUSHED - Feeling exhausted or fatigued.

BUSHER - A baseball player in a minor league. Any mediocre or second-rate performer; amateur.

BUSHWAH - Nonsense; pretentious talk; bold and deceitful absurdities; baloney, bullshit.

BUSHWHACK - To assault, especially from ambush. To attack violently.

BUSHY-TAILED - Energetic and alert; bright-eyed and bushy-tailed.

BUSIER THAN A ONE-ARMED PAPERHANGER (or A TALL HORSE IN FLYTIME) - Extremely busy.

BUSINESS - Excrement, especially that of a house pet. The equipment used for giving oneself a narcotic injection.

BUSINESS AS USUAL - Persistence in the ordinary course of events despite difficulties, morality, and other hindrances.

BUSINESS END - The dangerous or operative part of something, especially the muzzle of a gun.

BUSK - To perform music in subway stations or other public places, taking the contributions of listeners.

BUSS - To talk about; gossip over.

BUSSY - A bus driver.

BUST - Out of funds; destitute; broke. An arrest; a police raid. To break. To disperse or chase a rival street gang. To reduce in rank; demote. To tame a wild horse for riding. To break open a safe, vault, etc.; also, burglarize a place. To catch someone in an illegal or immoral act. To hit someone. To fail an examination or course; flunk.

BUST A GUT (or HAMSTRING or NUT) - To exert oneself to the utmost; work very hard.

BUST A MOVE - To leave, depart.

BUST ASS - To thrash; punish by beating; clobber, kick ass.

BUST BALLS - To discipline harshly; punish.

BUST CAPS - To fire the main gun of a tank. To have a firefight.

BUST CHOPS - To make fun of or tease someone; mock.

BUST CLOTHES - To dress up.

BUST HUMP - To work extremely hard; bust one's ass.

BUST ON - To attack someone or something.

BUST ONE'S ASS - To work or perform to one's utmost; exert oneself mightily.

BUST ONE'S BUTTONS - To be ostentatiously proud and happy.

BUST OUT - To be dismissed from a school for academic failure. To lose all one's money gambling, especially at craps. To break out.

BUST SOMEONE OUT - To win all of someone's money in a crap game, especially by cheating.

BUST SOMEONE WIDE OPEN - To beat someone severely.

BUST SOMEONE'S CHOPS - To annoy, criticize, or mock someone.

BUST UP - To end a marriage, friendship, or other association. To beat or batter someone.

BUST-OUT - The climax of a swindle, when the victim hands over the money.

BUST-UP - An argument, especially violent.

BUSTA - An unemployed person who is dependent on others. Someone who aspires to be someone else; wannabe; also, a kid trying to act tough.

BUSTED (or BUST) - Penniless; broke. Arrested or caught. Intoxicated.

BUSTER - 1. A weak or treacherous gang member; mark. 2. Someone or something that destroys, thwarts, or otherwise defeats what or who is indicated. 3. A splendid person, especially a robust one. Man; fellow; guy, brother.

BUSTIER - A brassiere that enhances the size of the breasts.

BUSTING OUT - Doing well; looking good.

BUSTLEBUTT - A very busy, energetic person; eager beaver.

BUSTY - Having large breasts; bosomy; chesty.

BUSY BEE - The powdered form of phencyclidine, a tranquilizer used in veterinary medicine, which is either sniffed or smoked in a tightly rolled cigarette; angel dust.

BUT GOOD - Very well; extremely; really.

BUTCHER - A surgeon, especially an incompetent one. A brutal and sanguinary ruler. To do crudely and clumsily what should be done with finesse.

BUTE - Butazolidin™, a drug sometimes used to stimulate racehorses.

BUTT - Bad; undesirable. Very; extremely. The buttocks; rump; ass. The remainder of a smoked cigarette or cigar. The final year of a prison term or a term of military enlistment. Something or someone disliked.

BUTT HEADS - To vie strongly; contend.

BUTT IN - To intrude oneself; proffer unwanted counsel.

BUTT NAKED - Totally nude.

BUTT OUT - To stop intruding; reverse one's butting in. To depart, especially abruptly.

BUTT PACK - Fanny pack.

BUTT UGLY - Very ugly; repulsive.

BUTT-KICKER - A very effective person.

BUTTER - Flattery; cajolery; soft soap. To flatter shamelessly and fulsomely.

BUTTER NO PARSNIPS - To have no practical effect; be unavailing.

BUTTER-AND-EGG MAN - A wealthy business executive or farmer from the provinces. A person who finances a theatrical production; angel.

BUTTERBALL - Any plump person.

BUTTERED BUN - Refers to a woman who has recently engaged in sexual activity.

BUTTERFINGERED - Clumsy, as if there was butter on someone's fingers.

BUTTERFINGERS - A clumsy, unhandy person, especially one who regularly drops things.

BUTTERFLIES - Dull spasms in one's stomach, caused by anxiety and nervousness.

BUTTERFLY - A caress made by winking an eye so that the lashes brush one's partner.

BUTTERHEAD - A black person regarded by others as a discredit to the black community.

BUTTERNUT - A Confederate soldier.

BUTTERS - (UK) Describes someone who is considered unattractive.

BUTTFUCK (or ASSFUCK, BUMFUCK) - To sue aggressively or exploit someone.

BUTTFUCK BUDDY - A close friend or sexual partner.

BUTTHEAD - A stupid person; oaf.

BUTTHOLE - The anus; asshole.

BUTTINSKY - A person who rudely intrudes himself, especially one who does so habitually.

BUTTLEGGER - A cigarette smuggler.

BUTTLLOAD - A large quantity; a lot of.

BUTTON (UP) ONE'S LIP - To stop talking; not tell what one knows.

BUTTON - The chin; point of the chin. The clitoris. A small quantity of a narcotic. A police officer's badge. A low-ranking member of the Mafia.

BUTTON DOWN - To classify; pigeonhole. To make precise; discard all but one alternative. To prepare for action; get ready.

BUTTON UP - To keep quiet; button one's lip. To finish something, especially tidily and handsomely. To lock up, close up, or make secure.

BUTTONDOWN (or BUTTONED-DOWN) - Conventional; of unmistakable respectability; conservative; square.

BUTTONED-UP - Neat; trim; prim.

BUTTONHOLE - To get someone's attention as if by taking hold by a buttonhole.

BUTTONHOOK - A maneuver in football where a pass receiver runs downfield and then suddenly spins and runs back toward the line of scrimmage.

BUTTONS - Having all one's wits about oneself.

BUTTPLUG - A despised person; asshole, jerk.

BUTTS (or BUTTS ON) - The declaration that one has or wants first rights to something.

BUY - To believe; accept as true. To agree to; acquiesce in. To do; effectuate. To hire; engage. To induce by money; bribe.

BUY A PIG IN A POKE - To accept or agree to something without careful examination; risk the unknown.

BUY INTO - To accept; acquiesce in.

BUY IT - Slang term meaning to die, especially in an accident.

BUY JAWBONE - To buy on credit.

BUY OFF ON - To agree to; buy.

BUY THE BIG ONE - To die.

BUY THE FARM (or THE RANCH) - To be killed; die.

BUY TIME - To be dilatory or evasive in order to gain time; temporize.

BUY-AND-BUST OPERATION - A police operation in which an undercover officer buys narcotics and then arrests the seller.

BUY-IN - Acceptance; acquiescence.

BUZZ - A telephone call. Subject of talk; gossip; rumor. A feeling or surge of pleasure, especially a pleasant sense of intoxication. A police squad car.

BUZZ ALONG - To depart.

BUZZ BOMB - A German WWII V-1 winged robot bomb.

BUZZ BOOK - A best-selling book; a book everyone is talking about.

BUZZ CUT - A cutting off of all or most of the hair; a total or near-total dehairing.

BUZZ IN - To arrive.

BUZZ OFF (or ALONG) - To depart.

BUZZ SOMEONE IN - To unlock an outer door for someone by actuating an electric unlatching device.

BUZZ-BUZZ - Unintelligible or tedious noise, especially continuous vociferation.

BUZZ-CRUSHER (or BUZZ-KILL) - Someone or something that ruins or dampens one's pleasure; killjoy, party-pooper.

BUZZARD - A dislikable person, especially an old man. The eagle worn as insignia by a colonel or a naval captain.

BUZZARD COLONEL - Chicken colonel.

BUZZED - Intoxicated, especially mildly so.

BUZZER - A police or other law-enforcement badge.

BUZZIN' - Drunk.

BUZZWORD (or BUZZPHRASE) - A modish technical or arcane term used to make one appear sophisticated.

BUZZWORTHY - Worthy of attention and gossip.

BUZZY - Drunk.

BVDs - Underwear, especially long underwear.

BY - With; as far as concerns. At; to; at the place of.

BY A NOSE - By a narrow margin; barely.

BY A WHISKER - Very nearly tied; very close.

BY CRACKY - By Christ. A euphemistic form.

BY GEORGE - A mild exclamation of surprise, approval, determination, emphasis, etc.

BY GOD - Used for emphasis.

BY GUESS AND BY GOD - By approximation and instinct; not by precise or infallible means.

BY THE BALLS - See HAVE someone BY THE BALLS.

BY THE BELL - See SAVED BY THE BELL.

BY THE BOOK - According to correct procedures; as one should under regulations, law, contract, etc.

BY THE NUMBERS - In a prescribed way; mechanically.

BY THE SEAT OF ONE'S PANTS - By instincts and feelings, without the benefit of formal training or procedures.

BY THE SHORT HAIRS - See HAVE someone BY THE SHORT HAIRS.

BY THE TRUCKFUL - In great quantity; numerous.

BYE - Goodbye.

BYOB - Bring your own bottle, or your own booze.

CABBAGEHEAD - A stupid person.

CABIN FEVER - Restlessness, impatience, and other signs of having been restrained too long.

CABOODLE - A totality; a discrete unit.

CABOOSE - A jail.

CACA or CACA or KAKA - 1. Excrement; SHIT. 2. Heroin.

CACK - (UK) Poor quality or rubbish.

CACKLE-BROAD or CACK-BROAD - A wealthy woman or society woman.

CACKLEBERRY - A hen's egg used for food.

CACTUS JUICE - Tequila.

CAD or CADDY or CADDIE - A Cadillac car.

CADDY - A Cadillac automobile.

CADET - A despised person; GEEK.

CADGE - To borrow; beg; BUM, MOOCH.

CADILLAC - 1. An ounce of heroin. 2. The best of its kind; standard of excellence; paragon.

CAFETERIA - Allowing a range of choice; Smorgasbord.

CAFETERIA CATHOLIC - A Roman Catholic who observes church prescriptions and prohibitions at their own discretion.

CAFF - (UK) A cafe.

CAFFIEND - Someone addicted to coffee. (Caffiend = caffeine + friend)

CAGE - 1. A prison. 2. A car or van. 3. A basketball basket or net. 4. Basketball.

CAGE RATTLER - A person not content with the humdrum or conventional.

CAGER - A basketball player.

CAGEY or CAGY - Shrewd; wary; pawky.

CAHOOTS - In collusion or partnership with someone.

CAIN - To cause trouble or create a commotion; to raise a fuss.

CAJ or CAS or CAZH - Casual; acceptable.

CAKE - 1. The female genitals. 2. A sexually attractive woman; FOX. 3. A ladies' man; DUDE. 4. Money.

CAKE JOB - An easy job; sinecure.

CAKE-BOY - A gay man.

CAKECUTTER - A cashier or other person who gives short change.

CAKEWALK - Something very easy; BREEZE, CINCH, PIECE OF CAKE.

CALABOOSE - A jail or prison; cell.

CALF - To dance energetically.

CALF LOVE - Puppy love.

CALICO - A woman; especially one considered sexually desirable.

CALIFORNIA BLANKET - Newspapers used as bedding.

CALIFORNIA KISS-OFF - To dismiss or reject someone abruptly or unceremoniously.

CALIFORNIA STOP - An instance of rolling slowly past a stop sign, rather than stopping.

CALL - A decision or judgment.

CALL HOGS - To snore very loudly.

CALL SOMEONE'S BLUFF - To force someone to justify or validate a pretense; require the truth.

CALL THE SHOTS - To be in charge.

CALL-DOWN - A reprimand; rebuke.

CALLY - A jail or police station.

CALM AS A CHRISTIAN WITH ACES WIRED - See COOL AS A CHRISTIAN WITH ACES WIRED.

CAMEL TOE - Unsightly crotch cleavage when a woman is wearing tight or see-through clothing.

CAMERA LOVES SOMEONE - The person named is very photogenic or telegenic.

CAMMIES or CAMIES - A camouflage suit or uniform.

CAMMO - Camouflage.

CAMP - 1. A male homosexual. 2. Effeminate behavior, such as mincing gait, fluttering gestures, or pronounced lisp. 3. CAN REALLY PICK EM, ONE (or ONE SURE KNOWS HOW TO PICK EM) - One is very selective, accurate, and successful in choices.

CAN'T BE ARSED - (UK) Unwilling to do something due to lack of interest or motivation.

CAN'T BUY - To have no possibility of; be totally denied.

CAN'T CARRY A TUNE IN A BUCKET, SOMEONE - Someone is tone-deaf; someone sings very badly.

CAN'T FIND HIS ASS WITH BOTH HANDS, HE - He is very stupid indeed; he is hopelessly drunk.

CAN'T GET OVER SOMETHING - To be surprised and unable to recover from shock.

CAN'T GET THERE FROM HERE, YOU - Used to indicate that a desired outcome or solution is not possible from the current starting point or approach.

CAN'T HALF - Very skilled at something.

CAN'T HIT THE SIDE OF A BARN (OR A BARN DOOR), SOMEONE - Someone is unable to throw accurately enough to hit anything at all.

CAN'T MAKE AN OMELET WITHOUT BREAKING EGGS, YOU - Used to justify the necessity of unpleasant actions or sacrifices to achieve a desired result.

CAN'T WIN FOR LOSING, SOMEONE - Someone seems entirely unable to make any sort of success; someone is persistently and distressingly bested.

CAN-OPENER - Any tool used to open a safe.

CAN-SHAKER - A fundraiser.

CANARY - 1. A girl or woman; CHICK. 2. A woman singer, especially of popular music. 3. An informer; STOOL PIGEON.

CANCELBOT - A computer program that intercepts and destroys a network message automatically when triggered by elements of the message.

CANCER STICK - A cigarette.

CANDIED - Addicted to cocaine.

CANDLELIGHT - Dusk or dawn.

CANDY - 1. Cocaine or hashish. 2. A sugar cube soaked with LSD; LSD. 3. Any barbiturate drug; drugs in general. 4. Something easily done; BREEZE, CINCH, PIECEOFCAKE.

CANDY ASS - A timid person; weakling; WIMP.

CANDY MAN - A narcotics supplier; CONNECTION, PUSHER.

CANDY STORE - 1. A place where wide-eyed dreams are or may be fulfilled. 2. Personal territory or property; TURF.

CANDY STRIPE - A secondary road on a map.

CANDY STRIPER - A young woman who is a volunteer nurse's aide in a hospital.

CANE - Using or consuming something excessively or greedily.

CANED - (UK) Drunk or under the influence of drugs.

CANNED - 1. To discharge an employee; FIRE. 2. To stop; cease, especially some objectionable behavior. 3. To score by throwing a basket. 4. Drunk. 5. Recorded; played from a phonograph record or magnetic tape. 6. Not fresh for the occasion; kept for easy and general use. 7. Filmed; completed.

CANNED COW - Canned milk; condensed milk.

CANNED GOODS - A virgin, either male or female.

CANNED HUNT - A hunt arranged at a hunting ranch.

CANNERY - A jail.

CANNIBAL SIXTY-NINE - Oral sex position involving mutual stimulation.

CANNON - 1. A pistol; firearm; PIECE. 2. A professional thief, especially a pickpocket.

CANNON FODDER - 1. Common soldiers, especially young and relatively untrained infantry soldiers; BULLET BAIT. 2. Any relatively low-ranking employee, associate, etc.

CANNONBALL - 1. A fast express or freight train. 2. A message sent from one prisoner to another, or from a prisoner to friends outside.

CANVAS, THE - A boxing ring; the SQUARED CIRCLE.

CAP - 1. Captain. 2. Mister; sir. 3. A capsule of narcotics. 4. To kill someone.

CAP ON SOMEONE - 1. To outdo someone; CAP, TOP. 2. To insult someone; DIS, PUT someone DOWN.

CAPER - 1. A drunken spree; a carouse; BINGE. 2. A prank; stunt. 3. A crime, especially a robbery.

CAPITAL - Money; cash.

CAPO - The head of a local unit of the Mafia; Mafia captain.

CAPO DI TUTTI CAPI - The chief of all chiefs; HEAD OF ALL THE HEADS, HONCHO, MISTER BIG, TOP DOG.

CAPPER - 1. A huckster's or professional gambler's helper, who attracts clients; SHILL. 2. The climax or end of something. 3. A story, joke, etc, that outdoes another one.

CAR - A group of prisoners from the same city or other place; locational clique.

CAR BRA - A protective covering for the front of a car, often made of black plastic.

CAR PARK - (UK) Verbally or physically attacking someone, often used for fights in pub car parks.

CAR-SURF - To ride on the outside of a car, especially on the trunk.

CAR-SURFING - Riding on the outside of a car.

CARB - Carbohydrate; food mainly consisting of carbohydrates.

CARBO - A carbohydrate food.

CARCASS - A human body; one's body, especially if heavy.

CARD - 1. A remarkable person, especially an eccentric or amusing one. 2. A portion of a narcotic; DECK. 3. A schedule; program of events.

CARD-CARRYING LOONY - Someone very unconventional or eccentric, not necessarily with

a mental illness.

CARDCARRYING - Authentic; genuine and longstanding.

CARDED (or PROOFED) - Checked to determine if one is of legal age for a purchase or participation.

CARDER - A criminal specializing in stolen credit card data.

CARDSHARP (or CARD SHARK) - A very clever card-player, especially an unscrupulous poker or bridge player.

CARDY (or CARDI or CARDIE) - A cardigan sweater.

CARE AND FEEDING - Solicitous care and nurturing, like that given an infant.

CARE PACKAGE - Gifts, money, etc, given to a relative or friend.

CAREBEAR - A cuddly, nice person.

CARHOP - A waitress or waiter who serves food to patrons in parked cars at a drive-in restaurant.

CARJACKING - The armed and violent stealing of a car from its driver.

CARNY (or CARNEY or CARNIE) - 1. A carnival. 2. A carnival worker or member of such a worker's family. 3. The occupational idiom or jargon of carnival people.

CAROUSEL FRAUD - (UK) Illegally avoiding taxes by importing and moving goods between countries.

CARPET - See CALL someone ON THE CARPET, ON THE CARPET, RED CARPET, ROLL OUT THE RED CARPET.

CARPET MUNCHER - (UK) A lesbian.

CARPET-BOMB - To mount a highly destructive and intense opposition.

CARPETBAG - To try to make a good impression.

CARRIER - See JEEP CARRIER.

CARROT-TOP - A redhead.

CARRY (or HAUL) THE MAIL - 1. CARRY THE LOAD. 2. To go very fast.

CARRY - 1. To have narcotics on one's person. 2. To be armed.

CARRY A LOAD - To be drunk.

CARRY A LOT OF WEIGHT - To be important; have authority.

CARRY A TUNE IN A BUCKET - See someone CAN'T CARRY A TUNE IN A BUCKET.

CARRY SOMEONE'S WATER - To do the menial jobs; be an underling, especially in politics.

CARRY THE BALL - To assume the active leading role.

CARRY THE BANNER - To walk the street all night for lack of a bed.

CARRY THE DIFFERENCE - To be armed.

CARRY THE LOAD (or THE BALL) - To do or be responsible for the major part of a job.

CARRY THE SOMETHING CHROMOSOME - To have the characteristics indicated.

CARRY THE STICK - To be a hobo; BUM AROUND.

CARRY THE TORCH - To love in a suffering way, especially because the desired one does not reciprocate.

CARRYING - 1. Armed, especially with a pistol. 2. Having narcotics on one's person.

CART - To transport; move; take.

CARTLOAD - A large amount; lots; heaps.

CARTWHEEL - A dollar, especially a silver dollar.

CARVE - To give one a thrill; send.

CARVED IN STONE, NOT - Not fixed or certain; subject to change.

CAS (CAZH) (also CAJ, CAZH) - Casual; informal; laid-back.

CASABAS - A woman's breasts.

CASANOVA (or CASANOVA) - A ladies' man and seducer; lover-boy.

CASE - 1. An odd, eccentric person; card, character. 2. To inspect, scrutinize, especially with a view to robbery or burglary.

CASE DOUGH - A small amount of money set aside for emergencies; mad money.

CASE THE JOINT - To look at how to break into a place, mainly to find something to steal; also, to check out a location.

CASED OUT - To accompany someone, especially in order to share winnings, luck, etc.

CASH COW - A source of money, especially a generous one.

CASH FLOW - Available money; cash.

CASH IN ON SOMETHING - To get profit or advantage from something, especially from something unexpected.

CASH IN ONE'S CHIPS (or CASH IT IN) - To die; kick the bucket. To withdraw from some arrangement, especially a business deal.

CASH-FOR-TRASH - Sordid, and told only for payment.

CASHED - Expired or depleted. Burnt out; tired.

CASHPOINT CRIPPLE - Someone parking illegally at a cashpoint or shop due to laziness.

CASSAVA - Slang for female genitals.

CAST - Interpretation; opinion; spin, take.

CAST A KITTEN - See HAVE KITTENS.

CAST IN CONCRETE, NOT - Not fixed or certain; subject to change.

CAST-IRON BALLS - See HAVE BRASS BALLS.

CASTING COUCH - The fancied sofa in a theatrical or film decision-maker's office upon which he appraises the talent of young women seeking roles.

CAT (or CAT A) - A bulldozer or Caterpillar tractor.

CAT - 1. A hobo or a migrant worker. 2. A prostitute. 3. The vulva; pussy. 4. A woman who, often subtly, attacks and denigrates other women; a spiteful and malicious woman. 5. A man who dresses flashily and ostentatiously pursues worldly pleasure; dude, hepcat, sport. 6. A jazz musician. 7. Hipster. 8. Any man; fellow; guy. 9. A sailboat with one fore-and-aft sail; a catboat. 10. Metcathe-none, an addictive synthetic narcotic similar to but more powerful than cocaine.

CAT - A catamaran boat.

CAT FIGHT - A particularly noisy and vicious struggle or squabble.

CAT'S MEOW - Something or someone that is superlative.

CATALOGUE MAN - Someone very unfashionable.

CATBIRD SEAT - An enviable position; a controlling position.

CATCH - 1. A highly desirable acquisition or engagement. 2. A hidden cost,

qualification, defect, etc; something to make one think twice. 3. To see, hear, or attend a particular entertainment. 4. To do desk duty, answering the telephone and receiving complaints. 5. To be penetrated in an anal sex act.

CATCH DOG - A scapegoat.

CATCH FIRE - To become markedly successful; catch on.

CATCH FLIES - 1. To distract the audience's attention from another performer by making unnecessary gestures and motions. 2. To gape and yawn, especially from boredom.

CATCH HELL - To be severely rebuked or punished.

CATCH IT - To be very severely rebuked or punished.

CATCH ON - 1. To see and understand, especially with insightful suddenness; grasp; get. 2. To be accepted and approved; succeed with the public.

CATCH SOME RAYS - To sunbathe.

CATCH SOME Z'S - To get some sleep.

CATCH SOMEONE FLAT-FOOTED (OR ON THEIR HEELS) - To surprise someone; catch someone unprepared.

CATCH SOMEONE SOMEWHERE, DOING SOMETHING, ETC - You will never discover this person in the situation or activity named.

CATCH SOMEONE WITH SOMEONE'S HAND IN THE TILL (OR THE COOKIE JAR) - See WITH ONE'S HAND IN THE TILL.

CATCH SOMEONE WITH THEIR PANTS DOWN - To find someone in the wrong with no possibility of evasion; catch someone in flagrante delicto.

CATCH THE WAVE - To seize an opportunity; take advantage of present trends.

CATCH YOU LATER - I will see you or talk to you later.

CATCH YOU ON THE FLIP SIDE - I will see you or talk to you later or tomorrow.

CATCH-22 - A condition or requirement very hard to fulfill, especially one which flatly contradicts others.

CATCH-ASCATCHCAN - Precarious; requiring keen readiness.

CATCH-UP - See PLAY CATCH-UP.

CATCHY - Seizing attention or admiration; attractive.

CATHOLIC BAGEL - A nontraditional bagel, especially flavored.

CATHOUSE - 1. A cheap lodging house; flophouse. 2. A brothel.

CATNAP - A short doze while sitting up.

CATS AND DOGS - Low-priced stocks, such as those returning no dividends at all.

CATSUIT - A tight-fitting garment covering the entire body.

CATTLE CALL - An audition announcement, especially for a number of extras; also the crowd resulting from such an announcement.

CATTLE SHOW - A convention or other occasion where political candidates display their notions, charisma, etc.

CATTY - Inclined to discredit others; malicious; spitefully gossipy.

CAUGHT IN A RUNDOWN - In an embarrassing and untenable plight.

CAUGHT LOOKING - Called out on strikes from not swinging.

CAULIFLOWER EAR - A boxer's or wrestler's ear deformed by injuries and accumulated scar tissue.

CAVALIER - A skillful boxer as distinct from a slugger or caveman.

CAVALRY - Last-minute rescue forces; a deus ex machina.

CAVE - A room; pad. Also, to surrender; give way; chicken out.

CAVEMAN - 1. A strong, crude man, especially one who is sexually rough and masterful; macho. 2. A strong hitter or slugger.

CAZH - Casual.

CCM - Money; cash.

CECIL (or CEE) - Cocaine.

CEILING - An upper limit.

CEL - A celluloid sheet made for an animated cartoon, now prized by collectors.

CELEB - A celebrity.

CELEBUTARD - A foolish celebrity. (celebrity + debutante + retard)

CELESTIAL DISCHARGE - Death.

CELLAR, THE - The lowest standing in a sports league, especially in a baseball league.

CELLAR-DWELLERS - The team in last place in a sports league.

CEMENT MIXER - 1. A dance or other act that includes a swiveling of the pelvis; grind. 2. A noisy car or truck.

CEMENT OVERCOAT (or KIMONO) - A casing of cement containing a corpse for disposal in deep water.

CEMENTHEAD - 1. A stupid person; dolt; boob. 2. A player known more for his combative than athletic skills; goon.

CENTER STAGE - The place of maximum visibility; forefront.

CENTERFOLD - A sexually desirable person.

CENTRAL - The most important site of what is indicated.

CENTRAL CASTING - The putative office whence ideal and stereotypical persons, products, recipes, etc., come.

CENTURION - A dependable defender; loyal soldier.

CENTURY - A hundred dollars.

CERTIFIABLE - So deranged as to be officially certified insane.

CHAIN GANG - The football officials who carry and set the chain that marks off the ten yards needed for a first down.

CHAIN LIGHTNING - Inferior whiskey.

CHAIN LOCKER - A wretched dockside bar.

CHAIN-DRINK - To have drink after drink without pause.

CHAIN-SMOKE - To smoke cigarette after cigarette, lighting the next one from the current one.

CHAIN-SNATCHER - A petty thief; punk.

CHAIR, THE - 1. The electric chair; the hot seat. 2. Death by legal electrocution.

CHAIR-WARMER - An untalented and dispensable person; warm body.

CHALK - A horse favored to win.

CHALK SOMETHING UP - To record credit or debit, as if by a chalk mark.

CHALK-EATER (or CHALK-PLAYER) - A person who bets only on the horse favored to win.

CHALK-TALK - A lecture, lesson, etc, accompanied by sketches.

CHAMP AT THE BIT - To be eager or enthusiastic.

CHAMPAGNE (or BOSS) TRICK - A rich or high-paying client.

CHANCE - See OUTSIDE CHANCE, A SNOWBALL'S CHANCE IN HELL.

CHANGE - Money. Also, a small additional amount.

CHANGE HATS - To change one's affiliations, role, etc.

CHANGE THE CHANNEL - To shift the topic of conversation.

CHANGE-UP - 1. A slow pitch delivered after a motion that might precede a fast pitch; a change of pace. 2. Any change, especially a pronounced one.

CHANNEL - A vein, usually in the crook of the elbow or the instep, favored for the injection of narcotics.

CHANNEL SURF - To shift rapidly from one television channel to another.

CHANNEL SURFER - A person who channel surfs; grazer, trawler.

CHAP (or CHAPPIE) - A man; fellow; guy, Joe.

CHAPPED - Angry; pissed off.

CHAPTER - 1. A division of a sports contest, especially an inning of baseball. 2. An episode, period, or passage.

CHAPTER AND VERSE - An exact detailed account. Also, the guiding documents or principles; rules.

CHARACTER - 1. A person who behaves oddly and often amusingly; an eccentric. 2. A person; joker.

CHARGE - 1. An injection of a narcotic. 2. An acute thrill of pleasure; blast, kick, rush. 3. Marijuana. Also, to rob.

CHARGED UP - 1. Intoxicated by a narcotic; high. 2. In a state of excited readiness and heightened keenness; pumped up.

CHARGER - A driver, especially of a hot rod.

CHARIOT - A car.

CHARITY GIRL - A sexually promiscuous young woman (1940s+)

CHARITY STRIPE (or LINE) - The free-throw line in basketball (1930s+)

CHARITY TOSS - A free throw in basketball (1940s+)

CHARLEY (or CHARLEY) HORSE - A stiff and painful inflammation of a muscle, especially the large thigh muscle (1887+)

CHARLEY COKE or CHARLIE - Cocaine or a cocaine addict (1940s+ Narcotics)

CHARLIE - Slang for cocaine.

CHARLIE - The Vietcong or a Vietcong soldier [Vietnam War armed forces; from "Victor Charlie," military voice alphabet designation for VC] See MISTER CHARLIE

CHARLIE'S ARMY CRATINGS - Packages of tinned and dried food [1970s+ Army; from "Charlie," the letter C in the military phonetic alphabet formerly used for voice communication]

CHART - 1. Figures and other material showing past performance, especially of a race horse; FORM, TRACK RECORD (1940s+ Horse racing) 2. A musical arrangement or score (1950s+ Cool musicians)

CHARTS, THE - The listings that show the popularity of a song, a record, etc (1960s+)

CHASE - 1. To take a usually milder drink after a drink of liquor (1906+) See PAPER CHASE 2. To go on frantic and futile pursuits (1960s+)

CHASE THE DRAGON - To inhale heroin fumes (1970s+ Narcotics)

CHASER - 1. A drink, often water, taken immediately after a drink of liquor (1897+) 2. A man in amatory pursuit of women; SKIRTCHASER (1894+) 3. An employee assigned to hurry others in their work (1920s+ Truckers) 4. An exit march; music played as the audience is leaving; recessional (1930s+ Show business) 5. A guard (1960s+ Prison) See AMBULANCE CHASER, FLYCHASER, WOMANCHASER

CHASSIS - The human physique, especially the body of a well-built woman; BUILD (1920s+) See CLASSY CHASSIS

CHAT - The capability of exchanging personal messages on a computer network (1980+ Computer)

CHAT BUBBLES - (UK) Talking nonsense.

CHAT UP - To charm and seduce with talk (1960s+)

CHATLISH - Style of writing used in online chats with abbreviations and contractions.

CHATTERING CLASSES - Sets of persons who are habitually and professionally garrulous - writers, scholars, politicians, and other members of the chattering classes (1990s+)

CHAUVINIST PIG - See MALE CHAUVINIST PIG

CHAV - (UK) Antisocial person with negative behaviors and appearance.

CHAW - (UK) To steal.

CHAW-HEAD - A person who chews tobacco or something else habitually (1990s+)

CHEAP - 1. Stingy; overly frugal; CHINTZY (1827+) 2. Reputedly easy of sexual conquest; ROUNDHEELED (1950s+) See DIRT CHEAP, ON THE CHEAP

CHEAP DATE (or DRUNK) - A person who needs very few drinks to become intoxicated (1940s+)

CHEAP IS CHEAP - You get what you pay for; In culture as in commerce, cheap is cheap

CHEAP SHOT - A malicious insult or action; something crude, underhanded, and damaging (1960s+ Sports)

CHEAPIE or CHEAPO - Cheaply made or cheaply sold item; ripoffs (first form 1898+, second 1950s+) See EL CHEAPO

CHEAPJACK or CHEAP JOHN - Inferior and cheap; obscure and third-rate; shoddy (from "Cheap Jack" and "Cheap John," itinerant hucksters or merchants of shoddy, attested from about 1850)

CHEAPSHIT - Inexpensive and inferior (1970s+)

CHEAPSHOT ARTIST or CHEAP-SHOTTER - A person who takes cheap shots (first form 1960s+, second 1970s+)

CHEAPSKATE - A nasty stingy person; TIGHTWAD (1896+)

CHEAT - To be sexually unfaithful; GET A LITTLE ON THE SIDE (1930s+)

CHEAT SHEET - 1. A paper used to replace or reinforce one's memory; CRIB (1950s+ Students) 2. SWINDLE SHEET

CHEATERS - 1. Spectacles • Attributed to the cartoonist and sports writer Tad Dorgan (1920+) 2. Marked playing cards (1940s+)

CHEATZ - Programs or files for cheating in computer games.

CHEBS - (Scot) A woman's breasts.

CHECK - 1. An expression of understanding, approval, etc (1922+) 2. A small quantity of a drug (1950s+ Narcotics) 3. To cancel; introduce a correction (1950s+ Sports broadcasting) 4. To look at; pay attention to; CHECK OUT (late 1700s+) See GIVE SOMEONE A BLANK CHECK, PICK UP THE TAB, RAIN CHECK, RUBBER CHECK, TAKE A RAIN CHECK

CHECK BOUNCER - A person who writes checks on bank accounts with insufficient funds or none whatever (1920s+)

CHECK IN - 1. To die; CHECK OUT (1912+) 2. To indicate one's arrival at a hotel, motel, etc (1918+)

CHECK INTO THE NET - To announce one's arrival or departure; keep others informed (1970s+ Army)

CHECK IT - To leave; BUG OFF, SPLIT • Usually an irritated command (1990s+ Teenagers)

CHECK MINUS - A mark indicating that one completed an effort, but it was wanting (used in grading)

CHECK ONE'S WALLET - To make sure that one has not been robbed or deluded (1960s+)

CHECK OUT - 1. A check-out counter or check-out person. 2. The act of leaving a place, as in "When's check-out time tomorrow?" n - Express check-out/slow sloppy check-out.

CHECK THAT - An expression used to tell someone to ignore the last remark; never mind.

CHECK THE PLUMBING - To go to the toilet; SEE A MAN ABOUT A DOG (1940s+)

CHECK YOUR SIX - Look behind you (from the aviation term "your six o'clock," referring to the relative location of an aircraft with 12 o'clock being directly in front of the airplane)

CHEDDAR - Cash; ready money; out of cheddar

CHEEBA or CHIBA or CHIBA CHIBA - Marijuana (1970s+ Narcotics)

CHEECHAKO - A newcomer; GREENHORN [1890s+; from Chinook jargon "chee chahco," meaning "newcomer"]

CHEEK - 1. Impudence; audacity; BRASS, CHUTZPA (1840+) 2. A buttock; BUN (1600+) [first sense apparently related to jaw, suggesting insolent speech]

CHEEK IT - To deceive by pretending more knowledge than one has; BLUFF, FAKE IT, WING IT (1895+ Students)

CHEEKY - Impudent; impertinent; rude (1850s+)

CHEERIO or CHEERY-BYE - Good-bye; used as a conscious amusing Britishism (1910+)

CHEERS - A salute or toast on taking a drink (1919+ British)

CHEESE - 1. Nonsense; lies; exaggerations; BALONEY (1950s+) 2. A fastball (1980s+ Baseball) 3. Vomit (1970s+) 4. Something out of date, often something so appallingly out of date that it has a certain chic appeal; CAMP, CORN (1980s+ Students) 5. Money; CHEDDAR 6. CHEESE IT - To flatulate; FART (1970s+) 7. To vomit; BARF (1970s+) 8. To make someone look outlandish; make cheesy (1990s+)

CHEESE EATER (or BUN) (also CHEESE EATER, CHEESY RIDER) - An informer or other despicable person; RAT (1940s+)

CHEESE IT - An exclamation of alarm and warning uttered when properly constituted authorities are approaching; To leave; depart; SCRAM (1811+ Underworld)

CHEESE WHIZ (also CHEEZ WHIZ) - Out of date; CHEESY; An unattractive girl; DOG, TWO-BAGGER (1980s+ Students)

CHEESE, THE - A superior person or thing (1818+; perhaps from Anglo-Indian slang "chiz" from Hindi, from Persian, "the thing")

CHEESEBALL - Stupid; inferior; CHEESY (1980s+)

CHEESECAKE - 1. Photographs and photography of women in clothing and poses that emphasize their sexuality (1930s+) 2. A woman's legs, breasts, hips, etc. (1940s+)

CHEESED OFF - Bored; disgusted (WWII Air Forces from British Armed forces)

CHEESEHEAD - 1. A stupid person (1920+) 2. A native or resident of Wisconsin (1980s+)

CHEESING - Smiling; From saying "cheese" - cheesing for the camera

CHEESY - Poor quality or tasteless.

CHEF - A person who prepares opium for smoking (1911+ Narcotics)

CHELSEA TRACTOR - (UK) An SUV.

CHEMICAL BLONDE (also BLEACHED BLONDE, PEROXIDE BLONDE, BOTTLE BLONDE) - A blonde whose hair is given its color by a bleach or another compound (1990s+)

CHEMISTRY - Feelings between persons; attractions and repulsions, but mainly attractions (referring to interpersonal connections)

CHENZED - (UK) Drunk or tired.

CHER (SHEHR) - Personable; attractive (1960s+ Teenagers; from French "dear")

CHERRIES - The flashing lights atop a police car or other emergency vehicle;
GUMBALL, PARTY HAT (1980s+).

CHERRY - 1. Virgin; sexually uninitiated. 2. In an unproved or maiden state of any sort. 3. In mint condition; pristine. 4. An inexperienced soldier sent to the front lines as a replacement. 5. The hymen. 6. To sexually deflower a virgin.

CHERRY PIE - 1. Something easily done or gotten; PIECE OF CAKE. 2. Money easily obtained (Circus) (1950s+).

CHERRY-PICK - To select the best and most profitable elements; PICK AND CHOOSE.

CHERRY-PICKER - 1. A man who especially prizes the sex act with young girls (1950s+). 2. A switch operator (1940s + Railroad). 3. An articulated crane with a bucketlike platform - a guy in a cherry-picker fixing the phone lines (1940s+).

CHERRY-PICKING - The selection of only what is most helpful to one's case.

CHERRY-TOP - A police car; PROWL CAR (1960s+ Teenagers).

CHEST - See PLAY CLOSE TO THE CHEST.

CHESTNUT - A trite old story, joke, song, etc.

CHESTY - 1. Having large breasts; bosomy (1950s+). 2. Prone to boast about one's virility, boldness, etc (1899+).

CHEVY or CHEV (SHEH vee, SHEHV) - A Chevrolet car (1930+).

CHEW - 1. To chew tobacco (1930s+). 2. To eat (1890+). 3. To talk; converse; discuss; JAW (1890s+).

CHEW GUM AT THE SAME TIME - See NOT HAVE BRAINS ENOUGH TO WALK AND CHEW GUM AT THE SAME TIME.

CHEW LIGHT BULBS - To do something extremely painful and nasty (1990s+).

CHEW NAILS - To be very angry; be livid (1970s+).

CHEW SOMEONE OUT (or up) - To reprimand severely; rebuke harshly; EAT someone OUT, REAM (WWII armed forces).

CHEW SOMEONE UP AND SPIT THEM OUT - To demolish someone; treat someone very harshly (1920+).

CHEW SOMEONE'S ASS (or ass out) - CHEW someone OUT (WWII armed forces).

CHEW SOMEONE'S EAR OFF - To talk overlong and tediously to someone (1919+).

CHEW THE FAT (or the rag) - To converse, especially in a relaxed and reminiscent way

(1900s+).

CHEW UP THE SCENERY - To overact; HAM (1930s+ Show business).

CHEWALLOP or CHEWALLOPER (chee WAH l?p) - A fall or dive that makes a loud splat (1836+).

CHEWED - Tired; defeated; BEAT (1940s + Black).

CHEWED UP - 1. Badly damaged or worn (1930s+). 2. CHEWED (1940s + Black).

CHEWY - 1. Substantial and desirable; rich (1920s+). 2. Needing thought and discussion; challenging; tricky (1920s+).

CHI TOWN - Chicago.

CHIB - (UK) A knife or weapon.

CHIBA SHOP - See SMOKE SHOP.

CHICAGO OVERCOAT - A coffin (1920s+).

CHICHI (CHEE CHEE) - 1. A woman's breasts; TITS. 2. Anything sexually attractive (late 1940s+ & Korean War armed forces).

CHICHI (SHEE SHEE, CHEE CHEE) - Something frilly, fancy, precious, and overdecorated (1940+; fr French fr chic).

CHICK - A woman, especially a young woman (1927+ Black; fr chicken; popularized in the beat and hippie movements).

CHICK FLICK - Film appealing to women.

CHICKEN - Coward or cowardly.

CHICKEN COLONEL - A full colonel; BIRD COLONEL (WWI Army).

CHICKEN FEED (or money) - A small amount of money; PEANUTS, SMALL POTATOES (1830s+).

CHICKEN OUT - To cancel or withdraw from an action because of fear; HAVE COLD FEET (1960s+).

CHICKEN SCRATCH - Illegible handwriting resembling the marks left by chicken feet on the ground.

CHICKEN SWITCH (or BUTTON) - A control utilized to eliminate a malfunctioning rocket during flight; a switch designed for destruction. Also, a control employed to eject an astronaut or pilot from a damaged vehicle. Originated in the 1950s in the field of astronautics.

CHICKEN-LIVERED - Cowardly; CHICKENHEARTED (1870s+).

CHICKENHAWK - 1. An adult homosexual who relishes young boys as sex partners (1960s + Homosexuals). 2. A child molester; SHORT EYE (1980s + Police). 3. Supports war but avoids risks themselves due to age.

CHICKENHEAD - 1. A stupid person (1950s+). 2. A petty criminal; PUNK (police 1990s+) or 3. A crack-addicted woman who prostitutes herself for narcotics - someone who would trade her body for crack, in street lingo, a chicken head.

CHICKENHEART - A coward.

CHICKENHEARTED - The act of being cowardly.

CHICKENS COME HOME TO ROOST - Consequences, although delayed, will happen (1810+).

CHICKENSHIT - 1. Contemptible; trivial; petty (1930s+). 2. Cowardly; CHICKEN (1940s+). 3. The rules, restrictions, rigors, and meanness of a minor and pretentious tyrant, or of a bureaucracy (WWI armed forces, but esp WWII). 4. An excessive display of authority; a hectoring insistence (WWI armed forces, but esp WWII). 5. A coward (1940s+).

CHICKENSHIT - Cowardly or afraid at a particular time.

CHICKIE - An exclamation of alarm and warning used when authorities approach. Common among New York City teenagers in the 1940s. Also refers to a young girl.

CHICKLET or CHICLET - A young girl. Coined in the 1920s, reinforced by a trademark for a brand of chewing gum.

CHIEF (or HEAD) COOK AND BOTTLE WASHER - The person in charge; the honcho.

CHIEF - 1. A man, fellow, or guy. Often used with ironic deference when addressing strangers. 2. Slang for LSD (narcotics) in the 1960s.

CHIEF OF STAFF - An army officer's wife, as used in the Army in the 1970s.

CHILD'S PLAY - Refers to something easy to do.

CHILL (also CHILLED) - 1. Excellent, wonderful, and cool. 2. To render someone unconscious, knock someone out, as seen in boxing in the 1930s. 3. To kill or murder, as referenced in incidents from the 1930s+. 4. To abruptly quench enthusiasm or amiability, often by snubbing someone since the 1920s. 5. To relax or become calm, as coined in the 1970s, often used as an exhortation.

CHILL OUT - To relax, calm oneself down.

CHILL PILL - A tranquilizer.

CHILLER - A film, play, or story meant to evoke delightful shudders of fear.

CHILLIN' - 1. Excellent, the best, or cool. 2. Relaxing, being carefree.

CHILLY - Wonderful, excellent, or cool.

CHILLY MO - An aloof and unengaged person; a cold fish. Origin: 1980s, Black slang.

CHIME IN - 1. To interrupt and offer one's input, butt in. 2. To provide commentary.

CHIMNEY WOK - (UK) TV satellite dish.

CHIP - A flat piece of excrement. 1. To hit a short, usually high shot onto the golf green. 2. To secretly use drugs while undergoing psychotherapy or treatment. 3.(UK) To leave.

CHIPPER - In a good mood.

CHIRPSING - Flirting.

CHOAD - Slang for penis.

CHOCKER - (UK) Full.

CHOIRBOY - An altar boy. This term refers humorously to a crime boss who is highly efficient and cold, making John Gotti seem like a choirboy.

CHOKE - To become ineffective due to tension or anxiety. Also, to tense up and become incapable of performing under pressure.

CHOKE A HORSE - To be very large in size. Also seen as "enough to choke a horse."

CHOKE POINT - A location where activity or passage cannot proceed due to congestion or obstruction. Also known as a bottleneck. Origin: 1960s+.

CHOKE UP - 1. To become tense and ineffective under pressure. Often used in sports contexts (1940s+). 2. To hold a bat high on the handle, effectively shortening it in baseball (1940s). 3. To cause speechlessness with pleasure or grief (1960s+).

CHOKED - (UK) Very disappointed.

CHOKED OUT - Intoxicated by narcotics, high, or stoned. Origin: 1990s, narcotics.

CHOKER - 1. Something worn around the neck, like a collar or necktie. Refers to the mouth or jaws in certain contexts (1840s+). 2. A short necklace (1920s+). 3. A person who becomes ineffective due to tension or anxiety (1980s+). 4. Slang for the vulva (1920s+). 5. To masturbate (1970s+).

CHOLO - Very virile, macho. Also refers to a fellow gang member, especially a streetwise young Latino male. Origin: 1970s+, possibly derived from Spanish.

CHOMP (or CHAMP) AT THE BIT - To be eager for action, impatient.

CHOMP - To chew. Origin: 1840s+, possibly related to the term "champ."

CHOOCH - Slang for the vulva, chocha.

CHOP ONE'S TEETH - Refers to "bat one's gums," which means to talk or speak.

CHOP SHOP - A place where stolen cars are dismantled for their parts. The term has a history dating back to 1883, where "chopped up" referred to stolen goods divided into small lots and hidden in different places. It later evolved to describe places like a "chop shop" where stolen cars are disassembled.

CHOPPER - 1. A submachine gun, particularly a Thompson. 2. A gangster who uses a submachine gun. 3. A helicopter. 4. A chopped car or motorcycle in hot rodding or motorcycling.

CHOPS - 1. Refers to the jaws, mouth, and cheeks beside the mouth, sometimes known as jowls. Used in expressions like "old turkey with pendulous chops" (1500+). 2. Musical technique or ability, often applied to musicians playing amplified music (1960s+ Jazz musicians). 3. Talent or skill in general. It can refer to the aptitude for something, like "You got the chops for it." (Related to skill, derived from the notion of a jazz musician's lips, essential for technique in playing an instrument). Also seen in expressions like "break chops," "bust one's ass," and more.

CHORD - A chord refers to a sequence of musical notes played simultaneously to create harmony or melody.

CHOW - Slang for food, meals, or fare. Used to describe meals like "How's the chow at Maxim's these days?" (1856+). Can also be used as a verb: "Let's chow" (1900+).

CHOW DOWN - To eat or have a meal. The term was used during WWII in the Navy and is similar to "chow hall" and "chow hound."

CHOW HALL - A room where meals are served, especially a military mess hall. Origin: 1940s+ Army.

CHOW HOUND - A person keenly interested in eating, often to a gluttonous extent. Origin: 1920s+ Army.

CHOW LINE - A line of individuals waiting to get food, commonly seen in armed forces settings. Origin: 1920s+ Armed forces.

CHOWDERHEAD - A slang term used to describe a stupid person. Origin: 1830s+.

CHRISTEN - To use something for the first time. For instance, "Let's christen the new bed" (1990+).

CHRISTIAN WITH ACES WIRED - Similar to "cool as a cucumber." Refers to someone who remains composed and unruffled even in challenging situations.

CHRISTMAS GOOSE - Used in the phrase "as full of shit as a Christmas goose." It suggests someone who is full of nonsense or lies.

CHRISTMAS TREE - 1. Refers to the assembly of valves, pipes, and gauges used to control the output of an oil well (1920s+ Oilfield). 2. A display of colored lights that flash in sequence, used to start drag races (1950s+ Car racing). 3. The control panel of a submarine (1940s+ Navy).

CHROME PONY - A slang term for a motorcycle. It's also known by other slang terms like "bad boy," "iron," or "sled" (1990s+).

CHROME-DOME - Refers to a bald person. Often used humorously or affectionately.

CHRON - Extremely good or bad, also refers to strong marijuana.

CHRONIC - A slang term for marijuana or pot. Often used to describe high-quality cannabis, such as "high-octane chronic" (1990s+).

CHUBBO - A slang term for an obese person. Originated among students in the 1980s.

CHUBBY - Refers to a penile erection, often humorously described as "a chubby in your pants."

CHUCK - 1. Slang for food or a meal, similar to "chow" or "eats." Also used as a verb in expressions like "to chuck a mean slider" (1990s+). 2. Can be used to refer to a white male, often as a term of address, used by Black individuals.

CHUFFED - (UK) Very happy or pleased.

CHUG OUT - Refers to producing or working on something steadily, such as coding or writing. For instance, "cheerfully sifted through hard copy of the bug-checked code he'd been chugging out."

CHUG-A-LUG - A slang term meaning to drink the entire contents of a glass or bottle without pausing. It's associated with the sound of repeated swallowing.

CHUKKER - In the context of sports, it refers to a division of a sports contest. The term has its origins in polo, where a "chukker" is a division of a polo game. The word itself is derived from the Hindi word "cakkar," meaning "circular running course."

CHUM - 1. A term that refers to a very close friend, similar to "buddy" or "pal," with possible mildly hostile undertones when used with strangers. 2. Also used to describe ground-up bait thrown into the water to attract fish.

CHUM-BUDDY - Denotes a particularly close friend. It's used to express a strong bond, as in "Yesterday's villains are tomorrow's chum-buddies." (1950s+)

CHUMMY - Describes someone who is very friendly or close, often implying a

relationship akin to being "buddy-buddy" or "palsy-walsy."

CHUMP - 1. Refers to a stupid person, especially a dupe or sucker. It can also be used as a verb, as in "You were chumped, Donna Rice and Marla Trump." (1877+) 2. "Chump change" pertains to a small or relatively insignificant amount of money, often used to convey the idea of a pittance or meager sum. (1950s+ Black) 3. Also used to describe someone who is easily fooled or deceived.

CHUMP CHANGE - 1. A small or meager amount of money, often considered insignificant. 2. In the context of carnivals, tokens that customers can redeem for cash.

CHUMP CHANGE - Very small amount of money.

CHUMPHEAD - A term used to call someone stupid or blockheaded.

CHUNDER - Refers to the act of vomiting. This term likely originates from the name of an Australian cartoon character.

CHUNGO BUNNY - A derogatory term used to refer to a Black person. Originated around the 1970s, possibly derived from "jungle bunny."

CHUNK - Refers to throwing or discarding something. For instance, "chunk up" means to gain weight, while "chunky" describes someone who is chubby or fat. (1830s+ and 1990s+)

CHUPPIE - A slang term combining "Chinese" and "yuppie," used to describe a Chinese individual who exhibits characteristics of a yuppie.

CHURCH KEY - An item used to open bottles or cans.

CHURN - 1. To artificially increase the activity level in a business or enterprise to generate higher commissions or feign busyness. 2. To produce written content rapidly and mechanically. (1940s+ and 1912+)

CHUTE - In the context of sports, it refers to a parachute. (1920+)

CHUTZPA - An extreme and offensive brashness, often manifesting as arrogant presumption. It can also be associated with hubris. Origin: 1892+

CIG - Short for "cigarette."

CIGARETTE or CIGARETTE BOAT - An inboard power boat with an open cockpit used for offshore racing and transporting contraband. (1970s+)

CIGAROOT - A playful term for a cigarette, influenced by "cheroot."

CIGGY or CIGGIE - Slang terms for a cigarette. For example, "a ciggy outside."

CINCH - 1. Refers to a certainty or something sure to happen. Also denotes something easily accomplished. (1880s+ Cowboys and 1890+) 2. As a verb, means to make

something certain or clinch it. For example, "We cinched it with a last-second field goal." (1883+)

CINCHERS - The brakes of a truck, car, or bus. (1930s+ Truckers & bus drivers)

CIRC - Abbreviation for "circumcision." (1990s+)

CIRCLE JERK - 1. Refers to a sex party involving mutual masturbation, often among teenagers. 2. Can describe any futile gathering, meeting, or session. (1940s+)

CIRCLE THE DRAIN - Refers to the condition of being close to death or dying.

CIRCLE THE WAGONS - To adopt a defensive stance or position. Origin: 1980s+; influenced by the defensive action taken in cowboy movies when a wagon train is threatened by hostile Indians.

CIRCUIT SLUGGER - Describes a talented home-run hitter in baseball.

CIRCULAR FILE - A term for a wastebasket.

CIRCUS - 1. Refers to any lively and uproarious occasion. For instance, "You should have been there—it was a circus." (1885+) 2. Can also denote a sex show, often featuring explicit content. (1870s+)

CIRCUS CATCH - Describes a particularly impressive and challenging catch in baseball. Origin: 1880s+ Baseball; inspired by the feats of circus performers.

CITIZEN - 1. Refers to a person seen as more conservative and conventional than oneself; often used in counterculture context. (1960s+ Black & counterculture) 2. Refers to someone who is not as adventurous or unconventional.

CITY HALL - Refers to the political powers and those who control finances and patronage.

CITY SLICKER - Describes a sharp and stylish urban individual, often contrasted with someone from the countryside.

CIVVIES - Refers to civilian clothing as opposed to a uniform or official attire.

CLAM - 1. A silent and trustworthy person who can keep a secret. For instance, "He's a clam, so feel free to confide in him." (1860s+) 2. Slang for a dollar, as in "That'll be eight clams for the oil." (1930s+) 3. Refers to a wrong or sour musical note. (1940s+ Jazz musicians) 4. Slang term for the vulva, particularly used in the phrase "BEARDED CLAM."

CLAM BUMPER - Derogatory term for a lesbian.

CLAM SHELLS - Refers to the mouth and jaws of a person.

CLAM UP - To become silent or refuse to talk, often to avoid revealing information.

CLAMBAKE - 1. Refers to any lively and noisy gathering, meeting, convention, or party. (1940s+) 2. Can also describe a jam session in the context of jazz. (1930s+ Jazz musicians)

CLAMP DOWN - Refers to intensifying measures against rule or lawbreakers, often involving stricter punishments.

CLAMPS, THE - A phrase used to describe the act of exerting control or pressure on someone or something, often to restrain or limit their actions.

CLANGER - (UK) Silly and embarrassing mistake. Refers to a significant mistake.

CLANKED - Describes a state of exhaustion or fatigue. For example, "I'm clanked after that long hike."

CLAP BACK - To respond in a sharp and witty manner to a criticism or insult.

CLAP, THE - Slang for gonorrhea. For instance, instead of using the term "gonorrhea," someone might refer to "the clap." Origin: 1587+; derived from early French "clapoir," meaning "bubo, swelling."

CLAPPED-OUT - Describes something that is worn-out, in poor condition, and ready for disposal. For example, "The civilian jumped into his clapped-out Mercury." Origin: 1940s+ Royal Air Force context.

CLAPPED-UP - Refers to being infected with gonorrhea. For instance, "In reality, she's a gotch-eyed, clapped-up hooker." Origin: 1960s+.

CLAPTRAP - Nonsense or rubbish, especially opinions or ideas.

CLARET - (UK) Blood, especially from bleeding. Slang term for blood. Origin: 1604+; borrowed from the red color of claret wine.

CLASS - 1. Refers to high quality or admirable style. For instance, "a real class joint" implies a place of high quality or admirable style. (1870s+) 2. Can also mean something or someone that is superior or excellent.

CLASS ACT, A - Refers to a person or thing that is admired for their style, quality, competence, etc.

CLASSIC - 1. Refers to powdered cocaine or blow. (1980s+ Narcotics) 2. Can also mean something that is exceptionally brilliant and unique. Origin: Undefined time.

CLASSY - 1. Describes something of high quality or first-rate. For instance, "That's a very classy speech you just made." (1891+) 2. Also used to describe something or someone as having prestige, aristocratic qualities, or a posh demeanor.

CLASSY CHASSIS - Describes a person's appealing figure or trim body.

CLAUS - Refers to SANTA CLAUS.

CLAW - Slang term for a police officer. Also used as a verb meaning to arrest. For instance, "The cops clawed him." Origin: 1917+ Underworld context.

CLAY PIGEON - 1. Refers to a person who is easily deceived or an easy mark. (1920s+) 2. Can also describe an aircraft catapulted from a ship. (1940s+ Navy) 3. Describes something that is easily achieved; a cinch. (1950s+)

CLAYMORE - Describes a danger or unpredicted peril. For example, "skipping from television to a feature-film career has its built-in Claymore." Origin: 1990s+; derived from the US claymore antipersonnel mine, named after a Scottish broadsword.

CLEAN (OR WIPE) UP THE FLOOR WITH SOMEONE - To decisively defeat someone. For instance, "If he said that to me, I'd clean up the floor with the bastard."

CLEAN - 1. Refers to not carrying anything forbidden, especially a firearm. For example, "Cops gave him a body-shake, and he came out clean." (1926+) 2. Can also mean innocent or unincriminated. (1300+) 3. Describes not producing radioactive contamination, as in "a clean bomb." (1950s+) 4. Refers to a lack of money; being broke or cleaned out. (Late 1900s+) 5. Describes something that is not lewd or obscene; morally acceptable. (1867+) 6. Refers to being well-dressed and clad in the latest style. For example, "He was really clean, with new clothes." (1960s+ Black) 7. Can also mean free from drug addiction. (1950s+ Narcotics) 8. Describes something with a trim, neat, and elegant appearance. Origin: 1400+.

CLEAN AND GREEN - A phrase indicating being free of police and other obstructions. (1970s+ Citizens band)

CLEAN AS A WHISTLE (OR A HOUND'S TOOTH) - Slang term indicating being perfectly clean. (1828+)

CLEAN SKIN - Someone unknown to authorities and unlikely to be detected when committing a crime.

CLEAN SOMEONE OUT - 1. Refers to winning all of someone's money in gambling, especially in a game of craps. (1812+) 2. Can also mean requiring or using up all of someone's money. For example, "Buying the condo cleaned them out." (1860s+)

CLEAN SOMEONE'S CLOCK - 1. Refers to attacking and punishing someone. For instance, "He really wanted to clean Ron Connelly's clock." 2. Can also mean to defeat or trounce someone. For example, "The DA had his clock cleaned." Origin: 1960s+; possibly from the idea of "clock" as "face."

CLEAN SWEEP - Describes a significant change that has a broad and sweeping effect.

CLEAN UP - Refers to making a substantial profit or getting an impressive return for one's money, often in a business context.

CLEAN UP ON SOMEONE - To decisively defeat or trounce someone.

CLEAN UP ONE'S ACT (OR SHIT) - To improve one's behavior, act properly and decently, or straighten up and fly right.

CLEANED OUT - Describes being lacking in money, especially due to losses from gambling or speculating. For instance, "Georgie was cleaned out after the third race." .

CLEANERS, THE - Refers to the process of exploiting or taking advantage of someone financially. For example, "Take someone to the cleaners."

CLEANING - Refers to the process of house-cleaning or tidying up.

CLEANUP - 1. Refers to a comprehensive effort or campaign against crime, filth, etc., often undertaken by authorities. For example, "The Mayor vowed another definitive cleanup of the Times Square area." (1920s+) 2. In baseball, batting fourth in the lineup. (1910+ Baseball) 3. Also describes a broad change with a sweeping effect. (Undefined context; possibly derived from baseball terminology)

CLEANUP SPOT (OR SLOT), THE - Refers to the fourth position in the batting order in baseball. Baseball context; derived from the idea that the batter in this position may "clean" the runners off the bases by driving them in to score.

CLEAR - Refers to earning a certain amount of money after taxes. For example, "He cleared 100 Gs."

CLEAR AS MUD - Describes something that is entirely unclear or lacking lucidity.

CLEAR OFF - Means to go away.

CLEAR OUT - Refers to departing or hitting the road.

CLEAR SAILING - Describes easy and unimpeded progress or easy going.

CLEAR SOMEONE - To demonstrate or declare someone free of suspicion. For instance, "The investigation cleared him, even though he looked guilty."

CLEAR UP - Refers to stopping using narcotics and seeking help to withdraw from drug addiction.

CLEM - 1. A fight between show people and the local citizenry. 2. Refers to dispersing rioting customers at a circus or carnival. (1920s+ Circus & carnival context)

CLEMO - 1. Executive clemency. 2. A prison escape. (1950s+ Prison context)

CLEVELAND - Slang term for a thousand dollars or a thousand-dollar bill. For example, "The British publicist offered me an exclusive with King Freddy for a Cleveland-\$1,000-but I passed." Origin: 1990s+; referring to the presidential portrait on the banknote.

CLICK - 1. Refers to an insight or sudden comprehension. 2. Can also mean a clique or group of people with a common interest. 3. Describes a kilometer. For instance, "a hundred and sixty clicks north of Saigon." (1960s+ Armed forces context) 4. To succeed or please an audience. For example, "If I can click with wholesalers, I should be ready to open up in about 3 weeks." (1910+ Theater context) 5. To evoke or precede a flash of insight. Origin: 1930s+. 6. To fit together precisely or go well together. For example, "Those two really click, like a well-oiled machine." (1920s+)

CLICKER - Refers to the remote-control device of a piece of electronics. (1980s+)

CLICKTEASE - Link suggesting something attractive but offering something else.

CLIFFHANGER - Describes a very suspenseful story, film, game, situation, etc. For instance, "The election was a cliffhanger, right through the recount."

CLIMB (OR GO UP) THE WALL - To become frantic, especially due to frustration or anxiety. For example, "By the time the cops came, I was about to climb the wall." (1970s+)

CLIMB ON THE BANDWAGON - Means to join or participate in a popular trend or movement.

CLIMB SOMEONE - To reprimand severely or chew out. Also refers to climbing over someone's frame, which has a similar sense in college slang of the 1890s.

CLIMBER - Refers to an ambitious person.

CLINCH - 1. Describes a close contact between two boxers where they hold each other's arms to stifle blows. 2. Can also mean an embrace or passionate hug. Origin: 1899+.

CLINCHER - Refers to the deciding or conclusive element; the bottom line. For instance, "One smudged fingerprint was the clincher."

CLIP - To murder someone.

CLIQUE - A close-knit group of friends or associates.

CLOCK - To notice or recognize something.

CLOSER - Someone who is skilled at persuading or convincing others, often used in sales or negotiation contexts.

CLOUT - 1.(USA) A shoplifter. 2.Influence, power, or recognition, often gained through social media or popularity.

CLOUTY - In a very good mood and pleased about something.

CLOWN - To make fun of or mock someone, often implying they are acting foolishly.

CLUTCH - Describes a situation where something or someone performs exceptionally well under pressure.

COAST IS CLEAR - It's safe or there's no danger, often used to indicate that nobody is watching.

COFFIN DODGER - (UK) An elderly person.

COFFIN NAIL - A cigarette.

CON - Criminal or fraud.

CONFUZZLED - (UK) Confused.

CONSERVATIVE - Conservative figure found doing something they've disapproved of.

CONVO - Abbreviation for "conversation," often used in text or casual speech.

COOL BEANS - Expression of approval or agreement, similar to "okay" or "sounds good."

COP - 1.Slang for the police. 2.To acquire or obtain, often used when obtaining something illegally or without paying.

COP SHOP - (UK) Police station.

COPPER - (UK) Slang for the police.

CORNY - Lame, cheesy, or uncool; often used to describe jokes or actions.

COST AN ARM AND A LEG - To be very expensive.

COUCH SURFING - Staying temporarily as a guest in someone's home, often sleeping on their couch, without formally renting or paying.

COUGAR - Older woman seeking younger men.

COWBOY UP - Toughening up in difficult situations.

CRACK - Smokable form of cocaine.

CRACKBERRY - Someone addicted to their Blackberry device.

CRACKER - Slang for a white person.

CRACKZ - Programs for cheating in computer games.

CRASH - Go to bed or sleep.

CRASH - To go to sleep or take a nap.

CRAY - Abbreviation of "crazy," often used to describe something that's extremely surprising or bizarre.

CREDIT - Recognition or acknowledgment, often used to give someone praise or respect.

CREEP - To stalk or behave in a disturbing or unsettling manner.

CREPS - (UK) Trainers (training shoes).

CRIB - Refers to one's home or place of residence.

CRIM - Abbreviation of criminal.

CRIMBLE - (UK) Christmas.

CRIMBO - (UK) Christmas.

CROAK - To die or pass away.

CROOK - To steal or engage in criminal activity.

CRUISIN' - Driving around without a specific destination, often for leisure or relaxation.

CRUNCH TIME - The period of intense pressure or activity leading up to an important deadline or event.

CRUNK - Very drunk.

CRUSTIE - (UK) A scruffy traveler.

CUBE FARM - A workplace with cubicles, often used humorously to describe an office environment.

CUCKOO - Crazy or eccentric; used to describe someone's behavior as odd.

CUNT NAZI - Woman preventing a man from dating another woman.

CUPERTINO - Slang for Apple Inc., referring to their headquarters in Cupertino, California.

CUPPA - Abbreviation of "cup of," often used to refer to a cup of tea or coffee.

CURRY AND RICE - (UK) Cocaine and heroin or crack cocaine.

CURVE - To reject or ignore someone romantically or socially.

CUSH - (UK) Savings or money set aside.

CUSHY - (UK) Easy.

CUT - To leave or depart, often used casually to indicate leaving a place.

CUT A RUG - To dance energetically and skillfully.

CUT THE CHEESE - Fart.

CUT THE MUSTARD - To meet expectations or perform adequately.

CUTIE - A term of endearment used to refer to someone who is cute or attractive.

CUZZY - Short for "cousin," often used to address a close friend as if they were family.

DAB - (UK) A fingerprint.

DAB HAND - An expert.

DEKECKING - (UK) Forcibly removing someone's trousers as drunken entertainment.

DELHI BELLY - (UK) Stomach upset, diarrhea caught when traveling.

DEMOB HAPPY - (UK) Behaving freely and carelessly due to impending retirement or

leaving a position.

DESK MONKEY - A clerk or administrator responsible for unnecessary paperwork.

DET - (UK) Good.

DEUCES - A way of saying goodbye or indicating that you're leaving; often used when leaving a situation or group of people.

DIB - A share of proceeds from a crime.

DIBS - (UK) Police.

DICK FLICK - A film appealing predominantly to men.

DICK PILLOWS - A woman's lips.

DIDDLY SQUAT - Knowing nothing about something.

DIET COKE - Inadequate; lacking what it takes.

DIME - A term used to describe an attractive person, usually referring to someone who is physically very appealing.

DIME PIECE - A highly attractive and physically appealing person; often used to describe someone who is considered a perfect ten in terms of looks.

DINGO - To leave or not show up for an arranged meeting.

DIPSTICK - A stupid person; an idiot.

DIRT CHEAP - Very inexpensive.

DIRTY - Unfair, dishonest, or morally questionable; often used to describe actions or behavior.

DIS - Abbreviation of "disrespect"; used to describe insulting or demeaning behavior towards someone.

DISGUSTABLE - Very disgusting.

DISS - To show disrespect towards someone.

DITZY - Eccentric, scatterbrained, silly, or stupid.

DIV - (UK) An idiot.

DIZZY - Confused, disoriented, or bewildered; often used to express a state of mental confusion.

DO A BAMBER - (UK) Make a mistake.

DO SOMEONE A SOLID - Do someone a favor.

DO YOUR DHOBI - Do your laundry.

DO YOUR LOLLY - Get very angry and show it.

DOBBER - (UK) A condom.

DODDLE - (UK) Very easy.

DODGY - (UK) Stolen, suspect, suspicious; can refer to people as untrustworthy.

DOG - A very ugly woman.

YOU CAN'T WIN 'EM ALL - Not every attempt or endeavor will be successful.

YOU CAN'T WIN - It is impossible to succeed or be victorious.

YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE A BRAIN SURGEON - This problem is not very difficult; intelligence is not required.

YOU GOT A PROBLEM WITH THAT? - A challenging question used to end a discussion or negotiation.

YOU GOT HANDS LIKE FEET - Describing someone's inability to catch things.

YOU GOT IT - 1. Agreement or acceptance of a request. 2. Affirming that someone is correct.

YOU KNOW WHAT (or you know who) - Something or someone that is obvious or taboo and not explicitly mentioned.

YOU NAME IT - Referring to everything that can be included; a comprehensive list.

YOU SAID IT - Agreeing strongly with what someone has said; expressing full agreement.

YOU SCRATCH MY BACK, I SCRATCH YOURS - Suggesting a mutually beneficial cooperation or exchange.

YOU SNOOZE, YOU LOSE - Missing an opportunity by not taking action.

YOU'RE TELLING ME - Strongly expressing agreement or acknowledging a well-known fact.

YOU'RE THE MAN - Congratulations or praise for a job well done.

YOUNG TURK - A person, usually young, who challenges or seeks to overthrow an established system or order; a rebel or reformer.
